NO COMMENT
WASHINGTON - Congressional activity between now and adjournment undoubtedly will continue to be influenced primarily by three factors: politics, the current business recession and the Soviet threat.
POLITICS- The election next November will be on the minds of most members of Congress most of the time. This is to be expected, and most members of Congress believe that, to get reelected, they must, generally speaking, try to please their constituents back home.
RECESSION- Consideration of so-called anti-recession legislation is inextricably tied up in politics in some manner. The big spenders are pushing "pump priming" programs and will continue to do so despite the fact that seven years of "pump priming" failed to reduce unemployment appreciably in the 30's.
The Eisenhower administration takes the position that the basic groundwork for economic recovery has been laid by expanding and speeding up existing programs--and that any new crash spending projects are inadvisable. It is contended that they would bring about huge deficit spending which in turn would stimulate new inflation.
Prospects for tax-reduction legislation may be determined by the outcome of this struggle. The administration expects to decide whether to recommend a tax cut after receiving further reports on economic conditions. These reports are expected to tell whether a tax cut is desirable as a business stimulant. There is considerable bipartisan support for such action.
SOVIET- The rapid growth in federal spending, triggered by the launching of Russia's first Sputnik continues unchecked and there is serious talk within Administration circles of a possible \$80 billion budget for the 1960 fiscal year.
Thus far this year, the House has acted on six appropriation bills. Instead of the substantial cuts vetoed last year, the House actually has increased the overall total by nearly \$500 million.
Unless the economy forces in Congress are able to check this trend--backed by "grass roots" support--there seems to be no limit to what the big spenders might demand--and get-- in the future.
Huge excessive spending could weaken the nation economically--and thereby make more difficult resistance to the Soviet program for world domination.
Such in brief is the general outlook in Washington. But a number of specific decisions are pending, including whether

to weaken state's rights still further by federalizing the unemployment compensation system.
YOUR SOCIAL SECURITY

Q: My wife just learned she could have started drawing benefits last summer when she had her 62nd birthday. Has she lost that money?
A: She should file a claim immediately. Benefits can be retroactive for a maximum of twelve months, but of course, no payments can be made for any month prior to age 62.
Q: My husband is now 60 and would like to retire and draw his social security. However I am working and earning over \$4000 a year. Would the amount of my earnings prevent him from drawing his social security - we file a joint tax return?
A: No, it would not. Only your husband's own wages or self-employment income could cause him to lose his benefits. Your earnings can in no way affect his receipt of social security.
Q: I receive a disability insurance check from Social Security in the amount of \$7.50 a month. As I have heard that the smallest benefit you pay is \$30 a month, I am wondering why my check is so low?
A: The reason you receive only \$7.50 a month must be because you also receive another disability benefit either from the Federal Gov't or under a Workmen's Compensation Law. While the full disability benefit is probably much higher than this, the other benefit you receive would offset against your social security disability benefit making only the smaller payment possible.
