## MAIL BOX IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM WILL BE HELD WEEK OF MAY 19 TO 24

The annual Mail Box Improvement Program will be observed this year during the week of May 19 to 24.

The Department wishes to encourage patrons of rural delivery service to provide suitable boxes, erected and maintained for easy and safe accessibility, presenting a neat appearance, and affording protection to mail.

Boxes that are improperly erected or in unserviceable condition retard delivery of mail and expose it to the weather.

Names of the box owners should be inscribed on the side of the box visible to the carrier as he approaches, or on the door if boxes are grouped. The box number may be inscribed on the box if desired. Boxes and supports should be kept painted.

When two or more boxes are grouped at one point, or the receptacles are not directly in front of the residents, the names and addresses must be on the front of the boxes.
