HALF OREGON FARM PRODUCTS ARE SOLD ELSEWHERE SAYS OSC

More than \$200 million are added to Oregon's economy

each year by farm products shipped to out of state markets, according to Oregon state college agricultural economists.

Out of state sales account for about one out of two dollars taken in by Oregon farmers. In case of specialty crops—such as Oregon's \$15 million annual pear crop—upwards of 90 percent are sold outside the state.

Crops with more than 90 percent of farm receipts from shipments to outside markets include snap beans and strawberries, each grossing around \$10 million a year.

Other berries, filberts, hops, cannery beets, green peas, cherries, prunes, and more than a dozen grass and legume seed crops are in the 90 percent-plus groups highly dependent on the outside markets.

Wheat and cattle top the outside market list for dollar volume. More than three-fourths of the cash income for Oregon's \$50 million annual wheat crop comes from outside the state, and one half the \$60 million yearly sales of cattle and calves are out of state.

YOUR SOCIAL SECURITY

Q: My invalid brother has employed me to care for him. Would the wages I receive count for social security purposes. I have heard that work for a family member does not count.

A: While it is true that some forms of family employment are not subject to social security tax, the exclusion does not apply when brothers or sisters

work for each other. Therefore, if you are paid wages of at least \$50 in a calendar quarter, these wages will count for security purposes.

However, there must be a bona-fide employer-employee relationship between you and your brother for this to be considered covered employment.

Q: I am employed as a caretaker for a church. The church does not report my wages for social security. Is there a reason for this?

A: Churches and other non-profit organizations are exempt from payment of social security taxes. This is because they have no earnings which go to the benefit of any shareholder or individual. These organizations may elect to have their employees covered by social security taxes. If this church is not reporting your wages it is probably because they have not made such an election.

Q: My father died on October 30 1939, but had done some work under Social Security prior to his death. Would there now be any benefits which could be made to my mother because of his work?

A: No. The 1939 amendments which added survivors benefits provide that the worker must have died after 1939 in order for the widow to receive monthly benefits. Since your father died in 1939 your mother cannot receive widow's benefits based upon his wage record.
