APPEALS FOR SAFE AND SANE FOURTH

Governor Robert D. Holmes today issued an appeal to all drivers for a "safe and sane" Fourth of July weekend on Oregon streets and highways.

"We still have a long way to go in our fight against traffic accidents and deaths," the Governor said, "and the celebration of our country's independence provides an excellent opportunity to renew the fight."

Noting that more Americans have died in traffic accidents in the last 10 years celebrating the Fourth than were killed in the Revolutionary War, Governor Holmes said "it has always seemed a major tragedy to me that more of our fellow countrymen have died using the privilege of driving than the number who died fighting for the right to this and other privileges."

Although the volume of traffic is expected to be as great, if not greater, than during any previous Fourth of July weekend, traffic safety officials will be shooting for a death-free holiday. The holiday period will run from p.m. Thursday, July

3, to midnight Sunday, July 6.

Last year, when the Fourth fell on a Thursday, and the holiday was only a 30-hour period, two persons were killed and 54 more injured in 165 accidents.

However, the entire week last year was clouded by a total of 12 deaths, five in one crash.

Most frequent among holiday hazards are speed to fast for conditions and drivers who attempt to crowd many miles into a day's travel. Other speed associated violations which account for a large toll of accidents are following too closely, passing without sufficient clearance and drinking.

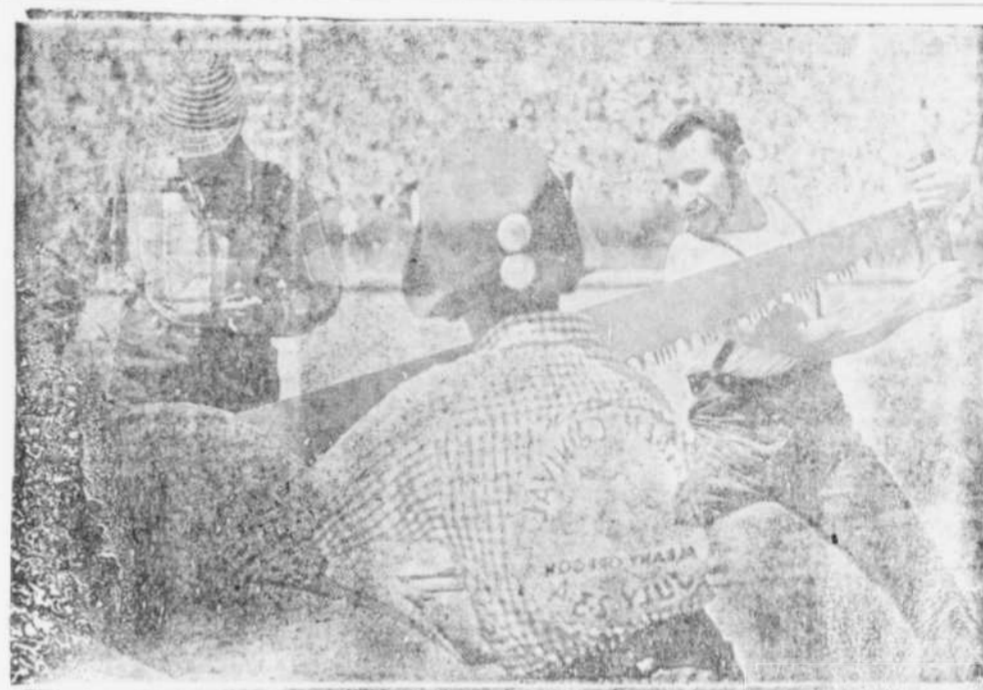
