### Rev. Beals New Nazarene Minister

Appointed to the Garfield Church of the Nazarene by Dr. W. D. McGraw Jr., Oregon Pacific Dist. Supt., is Rev. Stephen R. Beals, replacing Rev. Gerald Aylett who was called to Lebanon, Oregon. Rev. Beals is a fourth generation Oregonian, being born west of Astoria, and later living in Corvallis and Portland.

After attending Oregon State College for one year and being elected to Phi Eta Sigma, national honorary fraternity, he transferred to Cascade College in Portland. There he met his wife Carole, who received her B. A. degree in education in 1955 and has taught first grade in Portland Public Schools for three years.

The new minister received a B. A. degree in Psychology from Cascade college in 1956 and a B. A. degree in Education in 1957. During the past year he has been assistant pastor of the Mt. Scott Church of the Nazarene in Portland under the Rev. Lowell C. Ellis.

Future plans include continuing graduate work in Religious Education and foreign missionary appointment.

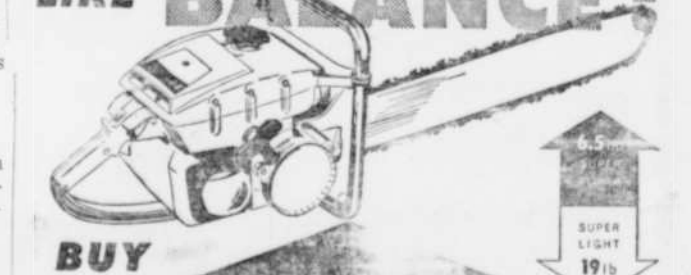
