FARMING LAND VALUES HIGHER IN OREGON
Marketing value of farm land and buildings in Oregon increased 4 percent during the year ending July 1, 1958, reports Mrs. Elvera Horrell, Oregon State College extension agricultural economist.
Most sales were made to enlarge existing farms. Other forces that helped push farm values to a record high include general inflation, demand for land for industrial use, and government programs for agriculture, the economist stated.
The prospect of a heavy crop output this year and climbing farm income also injected a note of optimism into the farm real estate market at mid year, Mrs. Horrell added.

Two Outboard Motors Run 50,000 Miles In 68 Days
NEW YORK, N. Y.—Setting a record unmatched in motorboating history, two 60-horsepower outboard motors have just completed a 24-hour-a-day endurance run of 50,000 miles. The 68-day trial, certified by impartial officials of the U. S. Auto Club, equalled twenty years of normal use by a boat owner.
The run, which smashed all endurance records of speed against elapsed time and elapsed time alone, was announced at the opening of Boat Show season. The endurance motors and boats will be exhibited at major Boat Shows across the nation.
Each of two six-cylinder Mercury outboard motors, both certified as standard production models, completed the run of 50,000 miles in two phases. The first 25,000 miles of continuous operation ended in October, and the second 25,000 miles were run from Nov. 20 to Dec. 24. Refueling while underway, the lead boat completed the twice-around-the-world distance in 68 days, 18 hours and 51 minutes, 0.6 seconds, at an average speed of 30.3 miles per hour. The second boat finished 4.8 seconds behind.
The five-place family runabouts used in the tests circled a lake in central Florida under constant supervision of USAC officials. Fuel was put aboard and drivers changed every four hours while underway. The boats maintained their cruising speeds day and night (above) despite ocean-like squalls, tropical storms, and below-freezing weather.
Said Mercury president Carl Kiekhaefer: "This endurance run, unmatched in motorboating history and the greatest distance ever traveled by any marine power plant in so short a period, firmly establishes the super-powered, high-thrust outboard motor as safe and dependable for extended family cruising."

OREGON TURKEY GROWERS KEEP MORE HENS
Oregon turkey growers intend to follow a national trend and keep more hens for the 1959 hatching season than they did this year, according to Stephen C. Marks, extension agricultural economist at Oregon State College.
In a recent U. S. department of agriculture survey, owners of turkey-breeder hens in 15 of the most important turkey-producing states, including Oregon, were questioned about their plans for 1959. Replies indicated these growers expect to keep 7 percent more heavybreed and 38 percent more light breed hens than they did at the beginning of 1958, Marks reported.
Oregon turkey breeders indicated they expect to keep somewhat fewer heavybreed hens for the 1959 hatching season but plan
