Here Are The Simple Rules--

The area will be divided into two districts to facilitate fairness in awarding prizes. All workers living in Estacada will be in District One, and all workers living outside the city limits will be in District Two. Workers are allowed to get subscriptions from any one in either district, or at any address.

The worker in each district finishing the campaign with the most votes in his own district will receive a District Capital Prize. Other prizes will be awarded to the next highest workers in any district by choice.

Workers not receiving awards will get cash commissions of 15 percent of all money they have handed in for subscriptions during the three weeks. A 20c "Milkshake" Bonus will be given on each new subscription handed in during the campaign and will be payable at the time the subscription is turned in at the office. 40c Bonus on 2 year orders.

No employee or near relative of any employee of the News is eligible to enter the campaign. Correspondents families will be allowed to compete. Children under 16 years must have written consent of parents or guardian, who will be expected to help their candidates.

In event of a tie each tying candidate will be given prizes identical in value.

A bonus of 2000 votes will be given each candidate turning in 3 or more subscriptions (either old or new) on the opening day of the campaign, and an additional 3,000 extra votes will be given to the candidate turning in the most subscriptions. These same bonus votes will be given for the report days of Wednesday, Nov. 26, Saturday, Nov. 29 and Wed. December 3.

To insure absolute fairness the campaign will be brought to a close under the sealed ballot box system. All subscriptions and money collected the last three days of the campaign must be in the sealed box when the campaign ends.

Wednesdays and Saturdays will be known as report days and all candidates are positively required to hand in all their subscriptions on each report day, at least two each report day to be considered active.

Votes will be issued on both new and old subscriptions. Credit for extra votes will be issued at the convenience of the campaign manager.

Candidates collecting more than the one subscription required to qualify his nomination before opening day will be barred from the campaign. Candidates living outside Estacada may bring or send their Saturday's reports on Mondays and their Wednesday's reports on Thursday except the last report which must be in on the closing day.

Prizes must be won in accordance with the conditions of the campaign and no candidate will be promised a certain prize for so many subscriptions or so much money.

Workers are not confined to their own town or neighborhood to sell subscriptions but may get orders from any person, any address.

Only one member of a family will be allowed to enter; but all members of the family are urged to help their worker.

Cash must accompany all subscriptions. The management reserves the right to add to these rules for the protection of this newspaper and the candidates.

After the capital prizes are awarded, the candidates having the highest number of votes will get first choice of the prizes, the second highest, the next choice, etc. All prizes will be awarded the closing night of the campaign. Those winning commissions will have checks mailed not later than the following Tuesday.

Close to a million dollars in property taxes were delivered Friday to Clackamas county courthouse from Portland General Electric company.

The PGE payment of \$949,200 for the 1958-59 tax year was the largest bill paid in the county and represents more than 10 percent of the county's total property tax collection, according to
