The advertisement in today's paper gives complete details of this new prize offer. Workers and their families are urged to read the ad carefully and ask for any additional information at the campaign office if needed.

Names of boys and girls working in the campaign will be found on this page. Subscribers will now be able to select a favorite worker and help him or her win one of the valuable prizes with their new or renewal subscription to the News.

Two Schwinn "American" bicycles valued at \$69.95 head the list of major prizes in the campaign. Workers winning these prizes may choose \$60 in cash instead of the bikes if they wish. Two other Schwinn bikes valued at \$59.95 and \$49.95 will be given, with winners having choice of \$50 or \$40 in cash in place of the bikes if desired. All workers who do not finish among the high four will receive cash commissions on each order they turn in during the 3 week drive, thus assuring each participant a good check for Christmas shopping.

North Fork Dam Produces Its First Electricity

Portland General Electric company's \$20,000,000 North Fork dam on the Clackamas river began producing its first commercial electricity last Saturday afternoon.

The new project, located 3 miles east of here, went officially on line when PGE president Frank W. Warren, Jr., pulled a switch activating one of the plant's two 26,500 kilowatt generators. Within a few days, according to company vice president O. E. Walsh, North Fork's second unit will be in operation bringing the project to its full capability of 53,000 kilowatts.

"The completion of North Fork" Walsh said "will mark the addition of 198,000 kilowatts developed by PGE for the Northwest power pool in the last 11 months." Walsh referred to the completion of Pelton dam on the Deschutes river last December with a capability of 120,000 kilowatts and the addition of a 25,000 kilowatt generating unit to the Faraday powerhouse on the Clackamas two miles below North Fork.

North Fork reached the production stage 26 months after the construction contract was signed between PGE and Guy F. Atkinson company of San Francisco.

The thinnest dam for its height in the United States—8 feet thick at the top, 32 feet at its base—North Fork, Walsh explained controls the might of the Clackamas by tenacity rather than bulk.

The leak formed behind North Fork is 4 miles long and one-quarter mile across at its widest point. Only 35 road miles from Portland, North Fork forms the largest public lake close to the city.

Alongside the reservoir a 16-acre recreational area has been developed by PGE. Known as Promontory park and scheduled to be opened next spring the park includes a combination of picnicking and camping areas.

Also constructed in conjunction with North Fork are extensive facilities for passing migrant fish around the dam. Major components include a two mile long fish ladder and a unique skimmer device coupled with a 5 mile long pipeline for downstream bound fish.

The pipeline will carry migrants around PGE's River Mill dam farther downstream.

Cost of fish passage facilities is estimated at \$3,100,000.
