Floods In California.

Stockton, Cal., March 28.—Reports from many sections of the San Joaquin valley showing that the flood caused by the late heavy rains is increasing instead of receding, as it was anticipated it would. Water is still pouring in on the lowlands, but in some places the area covered is not increasing, owing to the depth of the hockets. In some places the water is so deep that the owners do not expect to have their land drained before July, too late for planting a second crop. There are many small streams in this section, and it is these that are causing the most trouble, the larger ones being generally high-banked. In some places the flood will be beneficial. It is estimated that the flooded area covers nearly 30,000 acres.

Murderer Lynched.

Holton, Kan., March 28.—Harry Sanderson, the young farmer, who attempted to murder his sweetheart, Myrtle Fleischer, near Mayetta Sunday, but instead wounded Mrs. John Fleischer, her aunt, so that she died at 2 o'clock this morning, was lynched this morning by a mob from Mayetta.

After leaving a guard over the restaurant-keeper and attendant, the procession drove out to the edge of the city to a high bridge, which crossed Banner creek.
