Local Chicken Ordinances.

Following is an ordinance passed by the council of Eugene at its last regular session:

The chicken ordinance has not received the signature of the mayor yet but probably will in a few days and will then become a law. It is as follows:

Sec. 1. That it shall be unlawful for the owner or keeper of any chickens or any other domestic fowl or fowls, to permit or allow the same to run at large, or to be upon or enter the premises of any other person at any time, within the corporate limits of the city of Eugene.

Sec. 2. Any person violating the provisions of section one of this ordinance, shall, upon conviction, thereof before the City Recorder, be fined not less than \$2.50 nor more than \$10.00, and shall in all cases, in addition to the fine prescribed, pay the costs of prosecution, and in default of the payment of such fine and costs, shall be confined in the city jail one day for each \$2.00 of such fine and costs.

George Ozment.

Died in Cottage Grove, Oregon, April 18, 1899, at the home of his brother James S, at the age of 72 years, Mr George Ozment. Deceased came to Oregon in 1852 and settled in Lane county where he resided until his death.

New Mail Route.

Postmaster McCormack has been notified by the postoffice department that a new mail route has been established from this city to Mirth, a new office which has been ordered established at Spencer Creek. The new service will begin May 15, and the mail will be carried twice a week. The contract has been let to a Mr Ogden, of Washington, D C.
