Mr. Whitney and every one having friends in the Philippines we have heard express themselves say that wanting to come home is the burden of the letters received here.

John P. Callaway had the misfortune to get a span of horses drowned in the mill race above Fairmount Monday. It appears he was attempting to cross the stream and the team attempting to turn around got into deep water and drowned, Callaway saving himself by swimming ashore. A third horse was tied to the hind part of the wagon by a rope, which broke and freed the creature which swam ashore.

The War.

After a rest, we have tried to keep our readers posted as to the war in the Philippines which has been in progress now since the 4th day of February; and now at this writing we are glad to announce that peace is in a fair way of consummation. The Filipinos, an every body knew have been beaten. The result from the present outlook is the complete subjection of insurgents and their submission to such forms of government as the administration may dictate, which in all respects will be similar to that which has obtained for a hundred years in regard to our territories in the United States. Coburg Sawmill Leased.

The Booth-Kelley Lumber Company Saturday closed up the lease of the Coburg sawmill owned by J. C. Goodale for the term of twelve months with the option of purchasing the same at any time, at an agreed price, during the life of the lease.

This property is a valuable one on account of its adaptability for holding logs safely during the winter months. It is estimated that with a moderate expense, 10,000,000 feet can be stored in the ponds.

The Booth-Kelley Company takes possession of the mill June 1st, and will immediately operate the present mill to its greatest capacity. In the meantime they will purchase new motive power, and all other machinery necessary to do first-class and rapid work. Logging contracts will be let at once.

In a few days we hope to be able to chronicle more enterprises of the company. It is a great thing that men representing so much capital have located in Lane county.

Instructions for Peeling and Drying CHITTIM BARK

Clean all the moss off the tree before peeling. Peel the bark of the trunk below the tree down. Peel the flake as well as the trunk; the thinner the bark the better. Thick heavy, scabby bark will not be bought.
Dry the bark in the shade. Do not handle the bark for several hours after peeling; if you do it will wear it and make it black. Bark of black and rough bark will not be bought under any circumstances. Do not let it get wet. Dry so well that it will snap when broken. Break it up into small pieces so it can be well packed. Do not have the bark free from moss and wood and other kinds of bark. Have had the genuine chittim bark will be bought. It will be carefully inspected by us, and if I have bought this bark, so ten years I know what first-class bark is. Cut the bark at least one foot from the ground up on to avoid the rough, coarse bark at the foot of the tree. Do not attempt to break the bark until it is thoroughly dry. Break the bark up into pieces from one foot to one inch thick. Do not turn the bark with the sap or inside up; it will get dark if you do. After you peel the bark of the tree cut it up into strips two inches wide. For further information write or call upon.
