Mr. James Ebbert, of Springfield has just returned from looking after his interests in the Palouse country, in Washington and Idaho, consisting mainly of landed property and loans on farms. Mr Ebbert informs us that he has not seen harder times among farmers there at present since '93-4. Wheat is only worth 36 cents net, and that but few will realize a profit on farm products. That the crops were not an average one the past season. Fruit was hardly half a crop. He gathered only 83 boxes from an orchard on his farm this season, from which he got 1400 boxes last year. Apples are worth 90 cents to \$1 to the box now. To show how things are running up there Mr. Ebbert says a farmer who owns a fine farm in Idaho was unable to pay him the annual interest on a mortgage Mr. Ebbert held against it.

From Narrows Oregon.

A letter received from S B Amis who left this city about the 18th October for Harney Lake country says:

"Narrows, Oregon Nov. 10, 1899. The folks are all well—rained last night and is yet cloudy and warm. The ducks on the lakes are so thick here now, they sound like a thousand sewing machines running in the lakes and ponds. Paul and Philip, (two of the writers young nephews) have a lot of dressed ducks on hands all the time. We are going down to the channel soon to kill a wagon load. They are awful fat. Stock of all kinds are fat and a good crop of hay was harvested last summer."
