FULL PARTICULARS

Full particulars of the death of young Robert Eastland who was killed in a railroad wreck in British Columbia last week, have been received by his father through a letter written him by Dr J S Collins. Altogether, this case is of more than usual interest. Young Eastland was well known in Eugene and was universally respected. A bright handsome fellow, of just turning into manhood, possessed of no known evil habits, to all appearance with long life and a prosperous career, before him. But all at once an impulse to ramble takes possession of him. He hears of a "better country," just over yonder. He leaves his home and friends here in Eugene. For a while he is not heard of. His friends sometimes were heard to ask about "Bob Eastland," but soon, as is the case, in these days of rush and ramble among the youths of this country, Eastland was not missed, only by his parents, until the other day when word came over the wires from away up north that "Robert Eastland" was killed in a train-wreck and wanting to know what to do with the body? It was ascertained that he had no money, not even enough to pay for a decent winding sheet. His body was there among strangers and penniless. Then his friends here made up a sum sufficient to pay the freight charges on the cars to bring his body home. But by some particular freak of these who contributed to the fund to pay freight charges on Robert's body, the money was not sent to fill its mission of charity until full particulars of the young man's death should be received. Well as stated above the particulars have been received and are given in the words of the letter referred to which should serve as a warning to our young people who are dissatisfied with home and go out and in many cases lose their lives hobnobbing it on the railroad.

ROBT. E. EASTLAND.—Dear Sir: It is with sincere sympathy I try to write particulars of the sad death of the young man, Robert Eastland, at this place on the afternoon of Dec. 2. This place has a series of switch tracks in order to take the trains over the mountains, a height of 500 or 600 feet, not having yet got the tunnel finished. The freight train on which he was riding, having reached the summit and started down, when about half way down the hill the engine became unmanageable and ran away. The train crew, all but one brakeman, jumped off. He and Robert were called to jump, but they either did not hear or could not jump. The brakeman who did not jump was found seriously injured; but when Robert was found he was quite dead, lying some 40 or 50 feet from the wreck under a rock weighing 300 or 400 pounds. Both legs are broken, the right being almost severed from the body. When his body was searched a package of letters and recommendations was found, which disclosed his identity; also a gold watch and chain; one silver dollar, a pocket knife and comb. I may mention
