Robert Clow Dead.

Hon Robert Clow died at his residence in Junction City January 6, 1900, of cancer of the stomach after several weeks suffering.

Mr Clow was born in Scotland July 10 1827. Came to the United States in 1857, and to Oregon in 1867. Was married in 1868, was a member of the Legislature of Oregon in 1872, from Polk county, Joint Senator from Polk and Benton in 1880-2, was Superintendent of the Oregon penitentiary in 1887, was railroad commissioner in 1889-91. And was defeated for State Senator for Lane county on the Democratic ticket in 1894.

A Million Dollars.

Harriet E Orcutt in the "Commonwealth," truthfully says:

"A million dollars is more than any one person's rightful share of accumulated wealth. Why? Because no man ever earned a million dollars, not to mention the impossibility of earning a hundred or two hundred millions!"

Let us remember that it would take the man who is earning \$100 a month 833 years and four months to earn a million dollars. In order to have the million now, he would have had to begin earning it 430 years before Columbus discovered America. He would also have been obliged to have some other occupation by which to support himself and family during all that time, in order that he might save every dollar, every penny, of his salary to make up the million.

The adventures of a farmer or laborer, who had lived centuries enough to earn a million dollars, would be highly interesting. The average of farm wages throughout the United States is placed by the department of agriculture at \$220 a year.
