

Ordinance No. 74. An Ordinance providing for special election to be held in the City of Forest Grove, at which election the question is to be submitted whether an indebtedness of Thirty Thousand (\$30,000.00) Dollars is to be incurred by the City of Forest Grove, for erecting and constructing water works and an electric light plant.

Whereas, The City of Forest Grove, by Ordinance No. 72, as amended by Ordinance No. 73, has appointed commissioners to estimate the cost of constructing suitable water works upon the Deep Well System, together with an electric light plant, sufficient to supply the inhabitants of the city of Forest Grove with good and wholesome water and with electric lights within the said city.

And, Whereas, Said commissioners have estimated the cost of such improvement at Thirty Thousand (\$30,000.00) Dollars, and have filed such estimate with the Recorder.

And, Whereas, It is desired by the City of Forest Grove and by this Council to construct and erect such water works and electric light plant, providing the tax payers of the City of Forest Grove shall vote in favor of incurring an indebtedness of Thirty Thousand (\$30,000.00) Dollars for that purpose.

Therefore, The City of Forest Grove does ordain as follows:

Section I.—That a special election be held in the City of Forest on the 4th day of September, 1895, between the hours of nine o'clock in the morning and five o'clock in the afternoon of said day for the following purpose, to-wit: That at such special election there be and hereby is submitted to the taxpayers of the City of Forest Grove the question whether the City of Forest Grove shall incur an indebtedness of Thirty Thousand (\$30,000.00) Dollars, and issue the bonds of the City of Forest Grove in said amount for a period of not less than twenty years for the purpose of erecting and constructing suitable water works upon the Deep Well System, together with an electric light plant within the City of Forest Grove, sufficient to supply the inhabitants of said city with good and wholesome water and with electric lights within said city.

Section II.—Each person who shall vote for incurring such indebtedness for the purposes above set forth shall have written or printed upon his or her ticket the words "For Indebtedness—Yes." And each person voting against said indebtedness shall have printed upon his or her ticket, the words "For Indebtedness—No." And if upon such special election, two-thirds of the vote cast shall be in favor of such indebtedness, for the above described and proposed improvement, the Council of the City of Forest Grove will by ordinance provide for incurring an indebtedness not to exceed Thirty Thousand (\$30,000.00) Dollars, and will provide that the funds so realized be expended and used for constructing suitable water works upon the Deep Well System, together with an electric light plant, within the City of Forest Grove, sufficient to supply the inhabitants of the City of Forest Grove with good and wholesome water and with electric lights within the city.

Section III.—That such special election shall be at the city council room in said city; that all ballots shall be written or printed on plain unruled white paper; that such election shall be conducted in all respects in accordance with the provisions of Ordinance No. 16 as far as they are applicable, except as otherwise herein provided; that any person challenged, if such challenge be not withdrawn, the chairman of the judges shall administer to the person challenged the following oath, in lieu of the one prescribed by Section 14 of the general election law of the State of Oregon, passed at the 1891 session of the legislature: "You do solemnly swear (or affirm) that you are a citizen of the United States, or have declared your intention to become such, one year next preceding this election; that you are of the age of twenty-one years; that you have been a resident of this state for six months next preceding this election; that you now reside, and have resided in this city the three months next preceding this election; that you have property in this city on which you have paid a tax during the previous two years."

Section IV.—That David Smith, W. S. Ingles and E. A. Hyde be and hereby are appointed judges of such election and that S. C. Hughes and W. N. Ferrin be and are hereby appointed clerks of such election and the Recorder is hereby directed within three days hereof to notify such persons of their respective appointments; that the Recorder shall give notice of such election by posting notices in not less than three conspicuous places in this city at least ten days previous to the date of such election, which notices shall be as follows:

Special Election Notice. Notice is hereby given that on the 4th day of September, 1895,

At the council room of the City of Forest Grove a special election will be held to determine whether the City of Forest Grove shall incur an indebtedness of \$30,000 and issue the bonds of the City of Forest Grove in said amount for the purpose of erecting and constructing suitable water works upon the deep well system together with an electric light plant within the City of Forest Grove, sufficient to supply the inhabitants of said city with good and wholesome water and with electric lights within said city, which election will be held at 9 a. m. and will continue until 5 p. m. of the same day.

Dated this 21st day of August, 1895.

That the Recorder shall certify to the council the result of such special election under his hand and the seal of the city, after the vote has been canvassed by the Mayor and Recorder; that the Recorder be and hereby is instructed to procure three hundred each of the tickets required by this ordinance, and shall deliver them to one of the judges of such election to be distributed to electors at the polls.
