## ANOTHER CITY ELECTION.

The Water Commission to be Chosen Next Monday. The city council held a special meeting in the council chamber Saturday night. Councilmen Walker and Sappington were the absentees. After reading and approving the minutes of the Aug. 23 meeting, a certificate of posting the election notices and a canvass of the votes were read and on motion of Dr. Large, seconded by Mr. McNamer, the reports were adopted and ordered spread upon the records. Moved by Mr. Stewart and seconded by Dr. Large that a committee of three be appointed to investigate the question of location and report their finding to the council. The motion carried and the Mayor appointed Councilmen D. C. Stewart, C. L. Lange and G. L. Smith as the committee. On motion of Mr. McNamer, seconded by Dr. Large, it was voted to hold the election for choosing the water commission on Monday, Sept. 16. On motion there appointed as judges of election, Messrs. W. S. Ingles, M. D. Markham and Austin Craig as clerks of election Messrs. J. Wheelock Marsh and Geo. R. Hughes. On motion of Mr. McNamer, supported by Mr. Smith, it was decided that a committee be appointed to ascertain for what the prospect well can be bored. The committee is Councilmen McNamer Walker and Smith. Mr. Smith moved and Mr. Stewart seconded that a committee of three, to include the Mayor as chairman, be appointed to investigate the question of floating the bonds. Committee, Mayor Hughes, Councilmen Smith and Lange. The council then adjourned. As has been noticeable at late meetings several visitors were present. More interest is now being taken generally in the workings of the machinery of the city government.

## College Opening.

The new college building which will be begun to be used this fall is ready for occupancy now and in elegance and convenience puts Pacific University in the front of Oregon colleges. Much has been accomplished in the old halls and with its added advantages Pacific University students can be relied upon to keep the college in the leading position it now holds. School opens next Wednesday and every indication points to largely increased attendance. Forest Grove is an ideal educational center and with its city water works and electric light plant, now assured, offers every inducement to those to locate here who have children to school.

## AMONG THE HOPS.

Life in the Yards and the More Agreeable After-Recital. Forest Grove is living in the hop yards now. Several hundreds from here are now picking and the city is almost depopulated. The school rooms are nearly vacant, the streets are deserted during the day time and men of usually amiable dispositions are walking around with vexed countenances, wives and daughters, sisters and mothers are picking hops and the men are "hatching." Conveyances of all kinds have been streaming through and out of the city, filled with humanity of both sexes and all ages, all bound for the happy place where health and wealth are to be gained, the hop field. The wealth is coming gradually, very gradually, one per hundred, but the pickers are getting rugged, used to getting up early and braving chill morning dampness, used to the scorching mid-day sun and the frequent pouring, though brief, rain. After all these discomforts, losing their tempers a hundred times a day, going through what under any other name would be distressing drudgery, the people will return home. And how they will gloat over the scant pennies so laboriously earned and tell what a lovely time they had. And people of tender consciences will outrival even the most brazen of fishermen in their recitals of the wonderful amounts they picked, giving time, place and full particulars and referring to absent ones to verify their exaggerations. Not all, however, truth is still held in reverence by some and they will be hoisted down as croakers.

## County Court Proceedings.

The September term of the Washington County Commissioners Court, Judge Cornelius and Commissioners D. B. Reasoner and T. G. Todd, was Wednesday, Thursday and Friday of last week. An application of W. C. Whitlock was continued to October term. Road 333, petitioned for by J. O. Gustin and others having been favorably reported on by the viewers and there being no remonstrances, was ordered opened. Road 335, petitioned for by Thos. McClelland and others, was established as a public highway. Resignation of J. D. Letts as justice of the peace for Beaverton district continued. Petition for appointment of J. A. Reid to that position, continued. On petition John Long was allowed a rebate of \$14.02 on tax sale. Austin Craig, school superintendent, was allowed \$20 for the purchase of 200 copies of "Course of Study for Common Schools of Illinois" as asked for in August report. Reports of R. B. Goodin, county clerk, E. L. McCormick, recorder, and H. P. Ford, sheriff, examined and approved. Petition of J. W. Nickum for the location of a road on line as surveyed, disallowed. Ordered that Commissioner Todd have bridge on Dilley-Forest Grove road across Gales creek repaired and report at next term. Fred Langer's petition for change of road was granted and same located as a public highway. Old road affected by change vacated but old road was left for public travel until March 1, '96, though owner of land may place gates at either end. A further petition to make pass way for stock across county road on his own land by building a bridge which he was to keep in repair was granted until the further order of the court. Two of the inmates were ordered discharged from the poor house. \$50 allowed in aid of a destitute family. Harris bridge examined and accepted and \$1245.00 in all allowed T. C. Johnson, the contractor. W. A. Goodin, contractor, was allowed \$147 for Sully's bridge which was accepted. Petition of Wm. Nelson for aid for a bridge at Gray place left in the hands of county judge. Transcript fees allowed in the State of Oregon vs. Hiram Gentsis and vs. Jos. Lee.
