### The Electric Light System.

The council committee on electric  
lights, Messrs. J. C. Woods, W. S. Ingles  
and C. L. Large, has made a thorough  
study of the situation and made a very  
careful report with little room for im-  
provement. They found no uniformity  
existing in rates, one man paying \$4.00  
for eighty candle power and another  
\$2.00, and several other discrepancies  
almost as great. Some of the lights  
were not paying anything whatever.  
They have made rates uniform and on  
a basis of three cents per candle power.  
With the number at present in use the  
city will receive \$14.92 more a month  
than the company did, though in a  
number of cases the cost to consumers  
will be less and in the majority of cases  
at least no greater. The lights were also  
to run all night. A superintendent has  
been provided for who shall inspect  
daily the pumping plant, keep account  
of all material, see to repairs, etc. All  
lights will be installed and attended to  
by him and he will also collect all bills.  
He is made personally responsible for  
everything and placed under \$2000  
bonds. By this precaution and the ex-  
treme care required of him there is no  
possibility of waste or of the city losing  
anything to which it is entitled. An ef-  
ficient but economical service is assured.

The cost of installing is to be paid by  
the consumer but will be credited on his  
monthly bills until the amount is re-  
turned in light. Exceptions to the reg-  
ular rate have been made in favor of  
Marsh Memorial Hall, Ladies Hall, Sci-  
ence Hall and the new residence of  
David Smith. There a large number of  
lights in those buildings which are only  
occasionally used.

### Committee's Report.

To the Honorable Mayor and Com-  
mon Council of the City of Forest Grove,  
Oregon:

We your committee appointed to  
formulate plans and prices for the gov-  
ernment of the Electric Light System  
have ascertained the number of lights  
now burning in the city and supported  
by the Forest Grove Electric Light Sys-  
tem, and submit the following as our  
report:

No. lamps burning at schedule rate,	370
" " " " " special " "	333
" " not " "	73
Total	776

Whole amount of candle power  
installed, 8562

Whole amount of income from  
schedule (3c) rate per month, \$155.90

Whole amount received from  
special rates per month, 47.87

Total \$203.77

(Except Marsh Memorial Hall,  
David Smith's residence and  
Science Hall, the rate on these  
never having been established.)

Total amount received at (3c)  
rate, per month, \$203.77

We would recommend the adoption of  
three cents per candle power as the  
schedule rate, excepting all those listed  
"special", including Marsh Memorial  
Hall, Science Building and David Smith's  
new residence.

### Davis on Democracy.

To the Editor:

The following is a quotation from an  
article in the Oregonian of Dec. 30.

"There is another strong reason for  
anti-English feeling on our part. It is a  
matter of political history that no al-  
leged statesman of the United States has  
ever proposed free trade or any system  
approximating free trade with England  
but that he has had the most enthusias-  
tic support of England and her depen-  
dencies, whose people would be quick to  
reap the advantage of such industrial  
legislation."

The above remarkable quotation is  
from the pen of Napoleon Davis, a mem-  
ber of the Democratic State Central  
Committee, one of the bravest of Demo-  
cracy's brave and an honorable man.  
Considering its source it is a remarkable  
admission, and I have an idea that Mr.  
Davis must have strolled into the wrong  
committee rooms and there penned that  
article. However knowing Mr. Davis to  
be intensely patriotic I am not surprised  
that he should give little heed to party  
advantage, while we are so intently en-  
gaged in twisting the tail of Johnny  
Bull's lion. Now the only thing that  
worries me is what these "alleged"

statesmen of the Democratic party  
will think of this article of Mr. Davis'.  
It seems to me that the quotation given  
above pretty near spots the entire Demo-  
cratic party except the Randall Demo-  
crats and they are pretty near a minus  
quantity just now.

How it must cheer the heart of every  
Democrat in the state of Oregon (except  
those who failed to get a post office)

see Mr. Davis who disagrees so radically  
with our great and good friend Grover  
Cleveland as to the distribution of  
political plums in this state, so earnestly  
support his Venezuela policy even if he  
does incidentally refer to him as an  
"alleged" statesman.

However, casting all jokes aside, Mr.  
Davis should be commended for his  
true, manly words. His article in the  
Oregonian should be reprinted in every  
Republican organ in the state.

When the "alleged" statesmen of the  
Democratic party promulgated their  
tariff ideas and chose the "alleged"  
statesman Grover Cleveland as the best  
exponent of those ideas they had plenty  
of British sympathy at home and abroad.

For instance, B. F. Stiebel, president of  
the Nottingham Chamber of Commerce,  
addressing that honorable body, said:

"Let me say that I think at this moment  
when there is a presidential contest in  
the United States, whether it would be  
wise or not to name the United States so  
frequently. We have said these things  
over and over again and again and we  
have found that the very things we have  
said in defense of our interests have  
given our opponents an arm against us."

On July 21st, the Liverpool Echo re-  
peated the warning in these words: "Now  
that our home elections are over the  
great conflict which is going on in the  
United States of America naturally be-  
gins to attract a little more attention.  
The discussion of the question at issue  
from an English point of view has by  
one effect in the States and that inju-  
rious and paralyzing to those who are fight-  
ing the battles of Free Trade."

"Every public expression of opinion in  
this country hostile to the McKinley  
tariff is telegraphed across the Atlantic  
and eagerly reproduced by the Repub-  
lican papers throughout that country. As  
we said before, the apostles of Free  
Trade, if they wish to further the prin-  
ciples they are so proud of, should  
rapidly hold their tongues during the  
present presidential campaign. The  
utterances do incalculable harm to the  
Democratic cause and if Mr. Cleveland  
is after all defeated it will be largely  
owing to the too loudly and indiscreet  
expressed opinions from these shores."

From reading the above I am satisfied  
Mr. Davis is correct. Some of our "al-  
leged" statesmen have had too much  
sympathy from abroad.
