Kontine Work of the Fifty-Four

Robert Laughlin, of Augusta, Ky., who reported his house burned by murderers, who attacked him with knives, and whose wife and niece were burned in the building, has confessed that he was the murderer. The general theory then killed her and his wife to hide his crime. He denies this, and says they were asleep.

Charles Christy, of Waverly, Kan., young lawyer, has just arrived from Cuba, where he was a prisoner. He, with about 400 others, were captured in one battle near Havana. All but he and fifteen other Americans were lined up and shot. The American consul saved them. Christy is a member of one of the pioneer families of Coffey county. He is an enthusiastic Cuban patriot, and claims they have everything on the island except Havana, and He also says that that will soon fall. that since the new Spanish general has taken command no prisoners are taken.

An explosion of dynamite occurred at Viendendorfp, South Africa, and the poor quarter of the town has been blown to pieces. Hundreds of houses are in ruin, and the havoo wrought is fearful. The windows of every house in Johannesburg were broken by the explosion. The dynamite that caused the catastrophe filled eight trucks and made a hole thirty feet deep. Forty dead, nearly all of them horribly mutilated, were taken from the ruins, and the search is not yet completed. Two hundred of the most severely injured were admitted to the hospital, where several died.
