County School Column.

UNIVERSITY EXTENSION.

The University of Oregon desires to extend its usefulness not only to students in actual attendance but also to as many others as possible. It is felt that there are many persons in Oregon who are ambitious to undertake sound and thorough intellectual work at home, if they can find help and guidance.

Students who do the work described below in a satisfactory manner and pass the examinations which the University may prescribe, will receive credit for it.

For the present only a course in English Literature is offered. The books needed to begin the course are Dowden's Shakespeare, price 35 cents, and Shakespeare's Merchant of Venice, price 20 cents, from the Series of Eclectic English Classics.

The course will be conducted as follows.

- 1. Any person who desires to do so may join the class by sending in his name and ten cents in postage stamps, to pay for clerical work and return postage. The letter should be addressed, "University Extension Department," State University, Eugene, Oregon.

Oregon Summer School at Gearhart Park.—The next session of the Summer school will be at Gearhart Park, near Astoria, on the grounds of the school, July 21 to August 18, 1896. Tuition for the entire session, including all courses, five dollars.

Value of Music in School Discipline.—Follow the pupils into the schoolroom after a free, noisy recess on a hot day. Watch the transition from the free and uncontrolled movement of the playground to the quiet attention of the schoolroom through the medium of a song.

The teacher, if he expects to interest the pupils, must place before them tasks that they are able to perform and lessons that they can easily comprehend.

The chief function of education is simply to direct the attention along proper lines and see to it that the attention sustains itself when certain of the more important and vital facts are brought up for consideration.

Examinations give to school work a kind of dignity, increase the student's self-respect, and impart to the teacher's mind a judicial habit, freeing him from the great tendency to judge of his pupils by sentimental regard rather than by critical judgment.

The report for the year (nine months taught) of district 22, Middleton, shows 22 boys and 32 girls enrolled. Average number belonging 64, daily attendance 41. Mrs. Mary C. Saltus, teacher.
