Sudden Death of Miss Reitter.

Miss R. Reitter, age 19, eldest daughter of Charles Reitter, living on the Scappoose road, about 16 miles north-east of here, was found dead by her father, Friday, at 1 p. m. The young woman had all her life been subject to epileptic spasms, which during the past month, her parents had noted, were becoming more frequent.

Accident at Farmington.

Herman Rehse, age 11, son of C. Rehse, of Farmington, met with a painful accident at the Farmington schoolhouse Friday at the noon hour. He was by some means thrown into the air from a see-saw board, and in the fall both bones of his left arm were broken midway between the wrist and elbow, and one bone of the right arm was broken about three inches above the wrist.

Death of A. M. Parkhurst.

At the home of his son-in-law near Buxton, Washington county, Oregon, March 18, 1896, Albon M. Parkhurst aged seventy-four years and nine months. Albon M. Parkhurst was born at Ft. Covington Franklin county, N. Y., June 8th, 1822. May 27th, 1846 he was married to Miss Charille D. Fulton. In 1856 they removed to Iowa where they lived until Sept. 1892 when his wife preceded him to a brighter home.

Circuit Court.

The March term of the circuit court for Washington county was presided over Monday when it convened in Hillsboro by Judge Henry E. McGinn of department No. 2 of Multnomah county, Judge McBride being detained at home by sickness. Grand jurors drawn were: Anton Pfanner, Ira Bradley, M. S. Dailey, W. C. Jackson, C. L. Crocker, T. Humphreys, jr.

The petit jurors were excused until Monday, March 23, at 9 o'clock. Anton Pfanner was appointed foreman of the grand jury, which will continue in session during the week. Cases were disposed of as follows during the day: Mary Winkler vs. Ignatz Winkler; divorce granted. Northrup vs. Burdan, appeal from justice court; motion to dismiss appeal denied. State vs. Wilks & Glass; demurrer to indictment argued and overruled; plea of not guilty entered, and Friday, March 27 set for trial. Cooney vs. Gray; permission granted plaintiff to amend complaint by interlineations; amended complaint demurred to, and plaintiff given until Monday, the 23d, to answer. Ray vs. Ford, sheriff; plaintiff given five days to answer, and trial set for March 27. Mida vs. Pearson et al., sale of real property confirmed. Oregon Mortgage Company, limited, vs. H. P. Ford, sheriff; defendant given until March 23 to answer. State vs. Parrott; trial set for March 24, at 9 o'clock. Wachlin vs. School District No 52; trial set for March 24, at 10 o'clock. Zeitfuch vs. Robertson; divorce proceeding, set for March 26, Nickrits vs. White et al., trial set for March 30. First National Bank of Hillsboro, vs. Hughes, set for Wednesday, March 25. Court adjourned until Monday, March 31st.
