ARBOR DAY.

Department of Public Instruction, Salem, Oregon, March 6, 1896. To the Teachers of Oregon Public

Schools: By legislative action the second Friday, in the afternoon, of April of each year shall be known throughout the State as Arbor Day.

"In order that the children in our public schools shall assist in the work of adorning the school grounds with trees, and to stimulate the minds of children and to stimulate the minds of children towards the benefits of preservation and perpetuation of our forests and the growing of timber, it shall be the duty of the authorities in every public school district in the State to assemble the pupils in their charge on the above day in the school building or elsewhere, as they may deem proper, and to provide for and conduct, under the general supervision of city superintendents, county superinlents, teachers, and directors, or other school authorities having the general charge and oversight of the public schools in each city or district, to have and hold such exercises as shall tend to encourage such exercises as shall tend to encourage the planting, protection, and preserva-tion of trees and shrubs, and an acquaintance with the best methods to be adopted to accomplish such results."

It is very much desired that Arbor Day exercises be of such a character as to swaken and build up an interest in such school work as will be greatly to the advantage of the entire community.

While it is not deemed advisable to construct any special programme of exercises, it is very much to be hoped that each school will adopt such measures as will meet the purpose of the day in that community. These exercises are not lesigned simply to interest the school children, though that is prominent in all the plans, but it is also very much to be noped that the general public may become duly interested in the day.

I would suggest that the teachers of the various schools in active operation on Arbor Day throughout the State shall arrange a plan of exercises that, in their best judgment, will awaken an interest in all pupils. The teacher should state to the school the purpose of such day as contemplated in the legislative enactment. The planting and caring for trees, the great benefit they are to any individual community, and also to the State and Nation at large; also teaching the pupils the advantage of ornamenting the grounds in the way of building up a proper spirit of taste and refinement.

The community at large needs to be nade a part of the day's services, because of the benefit it may be in the way of awakening their interest in forest, groves, to assist us in beautifying our homes and our school grounds, but will seldom ever lo that work without our cooperati

Let this be a year memorable in the history of the public schools of Oregon for their interest in the adornment of school grounds. The great variety of conditions in this State will suggest a variety of modes in regard to Arbor Day. Is it not possible that some of the uninviting and bleak school grounds of the State may be made more pleasing to the eye and cultivating of taste? It is hoped that not one school actually at work on that day will neglect Arbor Day.
