**Women Ineligible for the Office of School Superintendent.**

The supreme court, in session in Pendleton, Monday, handed down a decision in the case of the State of Oregon ex rel. Carter, vs. Nellie M. Stevens, involving the eligibility of Miss Stevens to hold the office of county school superintendent of Union county.

The decision, which is a lengthy one, quotes article VI, section 8 of the constitution, which provides, "No person shall be elected or appointed to a county office who shall not be an elector of the county," and section 2 of article II, of the same instrument, which defines an elector as a male citizen. "Hence," the court says, "it necessarily follows that none but male citizens can be elected or appointed for county offices. Now, the office of superintendent of common schools, although not so mentioned in the constitution, was, at the adoption of that instrument and ever since has been and is now, unmistakably a county office. It is so named and designated in the statutes creating the office, and providing for the jurisdiction and duties of the head thereof. The incumbent is nominated and elected at the same time and in the same manner as other county officers; his jurisdiction is co-extensive with the boundaries of his county, and vacancies in the office are filled by appointment of the county court. In short, the office is in every sense a county office. Therefore, it follows that whatever view we may entertain as to the propriety of the constitutional provisions prohibiting women from holding county offices, we have no alternative but to declare that, under the provisions of that instrument, as it now exists, they are ineligible to the office in question, and that the act of 1893, as far as it conflicts with the constitution, is void. The judgment of the court below is therefore affirmed."

The decision was rendered earlier than was expected, owing to the approaching elections. There are fifteen women candidates for this office in the state. In Morrow county the three candidates are all women. As candidate's certificates must be filed before May 15, the time is short in which to prepare them.

**For County Treasurer.**  
The Republican County Central committee met Saturday afternoon in the jury room at the court house and elected a nominee for county treasurer to fill the vacancy caused by the death of J. W. Sappington. The candidates mentioned were numerous, among the E. B. Sappington of Forest Grove, son of the late treasurer, ex-Sheriff Green Hale, ex-Treasurer Wm. Pointer, ex-Judge Crandall, ex-Assessor J. C. Moore, J. N. Fisher, and A. B. Cady of Beaverton. On the fourth ballot Mr. Cady who had lead from the start was declared the choice.

Mr. Cady is generally acceptable because, as well as coming from a portion of the county not represented on the ticket, he is a G. A. R. man and gives recognition to that important element whom the Republican party delights to honor not only for what they have done but also because they are men who have been true and found true.
