**BEFORE AND AFTER.**

"Deputy Sheriff Bradford passed through town Thursday on his way to the northwest part of the county. 'Brad,' as his friends call him, is a terror to evil doers, and is filling his present position with credit."—Searchlight, Jan. 15.

If you wish a continuance of things for the next two years which have existed the past two years, vote for these men and be content to pay your taxes and 'sop yer soup'."—Searchlight, May 6.

This is the Searchlight before Mr. Bradford's nomination, and after. Against his efficiency as an officer or his character as a man nothing can be said, so he is accused of belonging to the "court house ring." It is true that Mr. Bradford has been in the court house for the past four years and it was in recognition of the ability and faithfulness he had shown as deputy that the Republican convention nominated him for sheriff. The record of those four years will elect him and they assure the people of Washington county a sheriff thoroughly versed in the intricate duties of that important office as well as fearless, honest and above reproach.

Mr. A. B. Cady, the republican nominee for county treasurer, is a man who has had an extensive business experience. During the civil war for two years he was adjutant, that is regimental book-keeper, and so satisfactorily fulfilled the trying duties of that position that he was highly complimented by the auditing officer when his regiment went out of commission at the close of the war. During the first four years of school life, a pupil should master the mechanical part of reading and the fundamental rules of arithmetic. In reading, he should learn to call words readily and correctly; he should learn the meaning and the use of punctuation marks; he should learn something of emphasis and inflection. In arithmetic, he should master the four fundamental rules. He should be able when he enters the grammar grade to add numbers as rapidly as he can speak results; to read differences and quotients as quickly as he names words in the reading lessons. This the average pupil can do, if he is properly taught the work of each grade.—Patrick.

**EDUCATIONAL CONVENTION**

To be held at Eugene, Oregon, June nineteenth and twentieth, eighteen hundred and ninety-six, under the auspices of the University of Oregon. The convention will begin on Friday afternoon at 1:30 p. m. and continue until Saturday, 4:00 p. m.

A fare of one and one third has been arranged for on the Southern Pacific railroad and one fare for the round trip on the boats of the Oregon Railroad and Navigation Company, if they are running at that time. Persons purchasing tickets for Eugene will take a receipt therefor at the time of the purchase.

Hon. G. M. Irwin, superintendent of public instruction, will act as chairman of the convention, and will lecture Friday evening, June nineteenth.

Prof. Charles Friedel, of the University of Oregon, will lecture on "The X rays." Hon. H. B. Miller will give an address on "Manners and morals in primary education."

The following topics will be discussed:

1. Botany in the common schools.
  2. Arithmetic in the common schools.
  3. Language in the common schools.
  4. Penmanship and letter-writing.
- Papers will be read on the following sub-topics:—  
 What should be taught in arithmetic? What should not be taught in arithmetic? What are the best means of reaching desirable results in arithmetic? Is there a place for algebra below the eighth grade? The value of definite rules, ideals, and standards in English composition. How to criticize a composition. The place for English in common schools. Penmanship and morals. Practice in letter-writing; its purpose and value. Can English be taught in the common schools? All papers are limited to ten minutes. The discussions will pertain exclusively to the eighth and lower grades. The faculties of the agricultural college, the normal school at Monmouth, and the state university, and leading principals and superintendents of the state will assist in the convention. All teachers and all who are interested in teaching are urged to attend. The date is Friday, June nineteenth, and Saturday, June twentieth, eighteen hundred and ninety-six.

**Teachers Meeting at Hillsboro**

Saturday, was held at the Hillsboro school house, the teachers institute which was set for this time four weeks ago. The following teachers were present: Mrs. Elliott, Mrs. Pittinger, Miss Coleman, Miss Wilcox, Mr. West, Mr. Coleman and Mr. McHargue. Mr. West was chosen chairman of the meeting. Miss Coleman read a very good paper on language work, bringing out the following points of value relating to it. First: Develop interest. Second: Language culture. Third: Teaching to think. Fourth: Taste of expression. Fifth: Culture to the mental faculties. She also spoke of encouraging pupils to refer to dictionary and when correcting work indicate the error and let pupils do their own correcting. Mrs. Elliott's subject was grammar. Instead of reading a paper on the subject she talked on the subject as an educator would talk. To say that her talk was good is putting it too mild, we think it was simply excellent. Mr. Coleman read a well received paper on the subject of reading.
