Republican Ratification.

Vets hall was crowded Tuesday night with people gathered to see and hear the Republican candidates for the legislature. Hon. David Smith presided. Hon. Samuel Hughes, candidate for senator was the first speaker and explained very clearly the taxation problem. Mr. Hughes is in favor of assessment districts, just as we now have road districts, of taxation of all tangible property and of deduction for debt where the corresponding credit is taxed. Mr. Marsh nominee for representative, showed, the best way out of present difficulties was to return, to full control of the government. The Republican party under whom for thirty years the country had prospered. Mr. Hudson, another of the legislative candidates, ably discussed present issues. All pledged themselves for the abolishing of useless commission and to retrenchment in state expenditures. A letter was read from the other nominee, for representative, Mr. Thompson, stating his regret that illness prevented his presence. Hon. R. H. Tyson, ex-state senator, spoke ably of why Republicanism is not and populism meant prosperity to people and nation. Mr. J. W. Wheeler of Greenville stated clearly his views on tariff and money. During the evening the Wheeler brothers of Greenville sang several acceptable campaign songs. The band played several lively airs before the meeting. The ratification was enthusiastic throughout. It was after ten before the last speaker finished.
