"The Daughters of Liberty, composed t our noblest women of conspicuous nerit, have assembled to greet and cheer heir benefactor, friend and the defender of our Christian civilization which was neralded by the bright morning star of hat republic where liberty reigneth for-

The Daughters of Liberty is an organiation founded upon the principles of hat immortal document whose glory and plendor shall decay and fade from hunan vision only where the love of country, with the love of home entwined, where he love of civil and religious liberty releemed by the blood of martyrs, shall ave ignominiously perished in the temple of the human heart and when the gilded cradle of avarice shall have ostered and reared its offspring to curse

the world with a race of men whose God s mammon, joined in wedlock with everasting black despair. Then and not intil then shall fade the glory and splendor of our immortal heritage of life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness, a heritage which transfigured our Revolutionary sires in that transcendent brightness which smote the British Lion with blindness at Lexington, at Bunker Hill, at Yorktown, and opened wide the majestic gates of bronze, with Liberty in-

scribed, to a protecting race fleeing from hat imperial purpled beast of prev who waded through slaughter to his throne. The Daughters of Liberty are inspired by motives of Christian purity and of patriotism, and devoted to the cause of civil and religious liberty.
