OFFICE HOLDING BY PROXY.

The ladies whose nominations for the county school superintendency were nullified by the recent decision of the supreme court that a woman could not constitutionally hold the office, are many of them running by proxy with the understanding that should their substitutes be elected they will be deputized and receive the emoluments. They forget however that the greater part of the duties cannot be delegated to one who could not legally hold the office. A clerk's work they could do but could not visit schools, preside at examinations, decide district disputes, arrange boundaries, apportion funds nor perform many other of the superintendent's duties. The men who in some of the counties have so gallantly agreed to run, if elected are apt to find more work than they have bargained for, especially when they must turn over all the emoluments to the lady who merely attends to correspondence and such minor matters.

Through the courtesy of one of our representatives in congress the HATCHET is in receipt of packages of seeds of tomatoes, cabbage, beets, pumpkins, beans, onions, parsnip, cucumber, carrots and other valuable garden truck. The packages are labeled "governmental and congressional seed distribution, purchased from D. Landreth & Sons, seedsmen, Phila." Secretary Olney is getting even with the congressmen. If he must furnish seeds he intends to label them so there will be no mistaking that it is for political and not scientific purposes that the government provides them. In the days of the old Roman republic politicians who were aspiring to popular favor made distributions of grain among the populace and these modern seed grants are along the same line.

The wise and efficient management of the county affairs during the past two years will lead every one who wants a continuance of the present economical and honest government to vote the republican ticket. The low tax levy and the party's record is a better guarantee than millions of promises such as the opposition candidates are so lavishly making. The republican party has been tried and found true. You will not vote amiss if you cast a straight republican ballot on next Monday.
