## Council Proceedings.

At its Friday session the city council were all present. Mr. Stewart presided in the absence of the mayor. Bills ordered paid: F. G. Mfg. Co., material for hose cart shed, \$5.89; E. A. Dixon, filling ditch, \$1.00; D. C. Stewart, wood, \$18.50 (placed to his credit on the C. W. & L.); H. Turner, hauling, \$1.50; Chas. LaChapelle, laying pipe, \$15.38; bill of carpenters employed on tank, \$3.85; carpenters on truck house, \$12.20; I. H. Smith, team work, \$2.00.

Report of Chas. LaChapelle showing the amount of articles found belonging to the city, ordered filed. A proposition from E. A. Dixon to fill ditch at 4 cents per rod, and re-fill at 3 cents, was accepted. Finance committee was instructed to procure suitable meter blanks.

The office of marshal was declared vacant and on ballot T. J. Harris was elected, receiving four votes. Mr. Markham was the other candidate and received one vote. Mr. Markham was allowed \$2.50 for his services as marshal and received the thanks of the council. L. C. Walker's plat of the city water system was adopted and a warrant ordered drawn for \$15 in payment.

At the special session of the council only Mayor Hughes was absent, councilmen McNamer, Knox and Large, and Chas. LaChapelle were appointed a committee to see to further extension of the water mains. The council negotiated for \$100 worth of one inch pipe and \$50 worth of three-fourth inch pipe through Abbott & Roe. This will be delivered Saturday and Mr. LaChapelle will at once connect every one who wants water with the mains.

Interest on the city bonded debt fell due May 15. It is six months and amounts to about \$400. About \$200 will remain in the treasury after paying this and the bill for the pipe just ordered. H. D. Stewart was appointed city water works bookkeeper. He is to open up a complete set of books. He is engaged for six months at the yearly salary of \$100. Besides this the back accounts are to be expeditiously for which service \$2 a day will be allowed.

Marshal T. J. Harris was appointed street commissioner at \$2 a day. Bill of F. G. Mfg. Co. for lumber, \$1.00, was allowed and ordered paid.


