Obituary. DIED.—On the 23d ult., near Laurel, Mrs. Elizabeth McFee, widow of the late H. C. McFee. Mrs. McFee was born in Ohio, emigrated from there to Iowa and from Iowa to Oregon in 1862, settling in this county where she remained till her death, which occurred May 23, 1896. Her age was 77 years 4 months and 12 days. The funeral service was conducted by David Lynch who delivered an able discourse using as his text the 12th chapter of Ecclesiastes. Then her body was interred in the Mount Olive cemetery there to remain till the resurrection morn.

Obituary. Albert Wilcox, son of David Wilcox of Cornelius, was born in Ontario, December, 3rd, 1841. He went to Wisconsin with his parents in 1842, where they lived for thirty years, thence moved to Oregon in 1872. He remained here only a short time and returned with his family to De Pere, Wis., where he lived for a number of years. After losing his wife he came to Oregon and has made his home with his sister Mrs. Walton most of the time since. He was a man of strong conviction of right and ever ready to help the needy in distress and an earnest and faithful worker in the Temperance cause. He had many friends wherever he lived. He had been sick nearly a year, and a few months since he began to improve and thought he was in fair way to recover, and bought out H. W. Scott & Co. in the Real Estate & Loan business at Forest Grove where he also moved the family. Soon after, his health began to fail again. He concluded to go to the Portland Hospital for treatment. But alas for human aid, a cancer had done the deadly work. He died at the hospital on Sunday the 24th, at 3 p. m. The funeral was held at Cornelius the 26th. He leaves a married daughter, an aged father, five brothers and one sister and many others to mourn his loss.
