J. H. Hanson closed, Dec. 20 a three months' term in district 1, West Union. 15 boys and 23 girls were enrolled. Average number belonging and daily attendance: September, 32, 28; October, 37, 32; November, 37, 31.

The school in district 66, above Gaston, closed Dec. 20 after a three months' term. A. M. Porter was the teacher. 13 boys and 15 girls were enrolled. Average number belonging and daily attendance: September, 19, 16; October, 23, 17; November, 28, 14.
