**VETERAN'S REUNION.**

Opening of the Four Great Days Celebration. Scenes at the Canvas City.

Buildings gay with bunting and flags, streets full of wagons bringing in visitors, sidewalks and stores filled with people, were the outward indications uptown Wednesday morning of the beginning of the veterans encampment. And the veterans themselves were out in force for everywhere were the blue, red or yellow badges signifying that the wearer had served his country in infantry, artillery or cavalry. Many too renewed the days when, not on parade, they wore Uncle Sam's blue, by appearing in the G. A. R. uniform.

The crowd were all turning down Pacific avenue and under its beautiful shade trees the walk was a cool and pleasant one. A short quarter mile off was the gate with its legend of "Camp Washington". Under the dark green branches of the lofty trees lay the canvas city with its snowy dwelling tents in streets and its stands brilliant in red, white and blue.

Prominent was the large dancing pavilion from which issued the spirited music of the violin to whose accompaniment young women and men were happily floating in graceful measures before a still larger concourse of interested watchers. Around the bicycle track speedy riders, ladies and gentlemen, were whirling at breakneck pace. The big merry-go-around with its horses all ridged and its carriages filled was puffing around while a wheezy Yankee Doodle from the organ vied with the noise of the steam engine. It was a glad company there, children of all ages and both sexes, and around those waiting their turn for a drive or a gallop and others enjoying the scene.

A two-story pagoda held the Forest Grove band whose music is ever welcome and the bright uniforms of the boys lent color to the brilliant spectacle. Seats for several hundred arranged in front of the large speaking stand showed where the exercises would be held. Old soldiers exchanging stories were gathered there as were others by the headquarters.

Little booths for ice cream, fruit, and candies were on every hand, nor was there absent the peanuts, popcorn and lemonade, without which no public picnic can be a success. Two lesser horse swings were receiving their share of patronage. The large dining hall with its seats for over a hundred at a time was an inviting feature. Five large ranges and other formidable kitchen equipment showed what a task it was to feed even a small army. Mrs. Crow had general supervision, and the arrangements were well ordered and the hungry people were fed expeditiously and sent away satisfied, no small item in the satisfaction with which the camp is regarded.

Wednesday Evening—Prayer Rev. A. Rogers; welcome, Mayor Hughes; response, President Cronkite; adjutant's proclamation of opening camp; short talks by Comrades A. B. Cady, of civil war, and N. J. Walker, of Mexican war; original poem by Comrade Eaton.

Thursday Morning—Short talks by Lieut. A. B. Cady, Capt. A. M. Collins, Sergt. J. P. Hicks and Comrade Tait.

Thursday Afternoon—Hon. T. H. Tongue addresses the veterans.

Friday Afternoon—Hon. S. B. Huston and Prof. J. H. Stanley speak to the Sons of Veterans. In the evening a series of stereopticon views of the war will be given by Comrade Downs. A detailed account of the encampment will appear in next week's issue.

At 12 o'clock noon to-day, the second day, there were enrolled 123 veterans, divided among the states as follows: New York, 5; Pennsylvania, 3; Ohio, 9; Michigan, 11; Indiana, 10; Illinois, 15; Wisconsin, 11; Iowa, 14; Missouri, 5; Minnesota, 5; Nebraska, 1; Kansas, 1. Massachusetts, 2; Colorado, 2; Washington, 1; West Virginia, 1; D. C., 1; Tennessee, 2; Texas, 1; Mexican War Veterans, 3; regular army, 1; Confederates, 2; Oregon, 13.
