IMMIGRATION.

While currency and tariff are causing their quadrennial rent among the people of these United States, one question, a matter of vital value, is left alone. The Republicans have bid for a better class of immigrants, the democrats will notice that it is desirable, and a similar reference probably will appear in the populist platform but no great leader has yet thought it an issue, has even mentioned it with more than the barest allusion.

That our prisons are being filled to overflowing, that crime is rife on every hand, is it evidence that through oppression of money power men have been made desperate?

That almshouses have not accommodations for one-half those seeking aid, that destitution is common, starvation not uncommon, that men are toiling more hours than nature will tolerate and then need the aid of women and children's tasks to keep body and soul together. Are these the signs alone of insufficient tariff?

Initiative and referendum are loudly urged as the only cure for political immorality, for the dishonesty of officeholders and the corruption of lobbyists. What is the remedy for ignorant or purchased votes, for crooked elections? To the downtrodden and poverty stricken of all the old world this continent has offered a refuge, to the disheartened it has been held out as a land of golden promise. Here they have flocked by the hundreds of thousands as fast as they could gather the \$12 or \$15 which carried them across the ocean. For their future here they had no thought. So they have come, 20,000,000 of them in the past three-quarters of a century. Some to build themselves homes in the forest, some to settle the unoccupied prairies. They have made places for themselves, live peaceably and add to the wealth of the country by their labor, good citizens they have made, have conformed themselves to our ways and are welcome. Others, and each succeeding year makes the proportion of these undesired additions greater, to crowd out our own workmen, to reduce labor to the level of the poverty of Europe, to create dissensions and discontent where they have not become burdens, inmates of prisons or additions to the free criminal class. One-third of the population, they furnish more than one-half of the criminals and an equal proportion of the paupers. The children of this class outdo their parents for of the juvenile delinquents two-thirds are from them.

While millions are being expended annually to secure general intelligence this influx of depravity, dependency and illiteracy is retarding and making vain all efforts. Popular government with such people would be the uttermost failure and yet they are securing control of all branches of our government in proportion not to their strength but to their political activity and unscrupulous methods. are cast by ignorance or fraud is not a safeguard but a menace.

These people come here, cut off the livelihood of our own citizens, live in a way foreign to us and send back their savings to friends and families across the water to whom they hope eventually to return. Beside this gigantic drain balances of trade fade into insignificance. With the pauper competition at home that which tariff protects us against is not worthy of mention. For the desirable immigrant, such as those who came here in earlier days and helped make our nation what it is, there is still room but against the ticket of leave men, the dependent, the ignorant and the vicious, the doors should be promptly closed.

Protection is needed, urgently needed but it is a more thorough protection than that which guards only against the pauper laborer abroad and ignores him when he has shifted himself nearer and is more dangerous.

In face of such a danger as this immigration problem presents, party differences should be forgotten and common measures for relief be taken. Its record however bars one from looking to the democratic party for any encouragement and it is the Republican party, ever watchful of the people's interests, that must be trusted. Nor will that reliance be misplaced. Protection is to be the policy regardless of what is made the issue and that protection will not be one-sided. Strict enforcement of present laws, a head tax or duty on immigrants, an educational test and the extension of required residence here before naturalization will mark the McKinley administration and add new lustre to the bright history of that party whose succeeding years have been movements forward to the firm establishment and perpetuation of a system of government the most glorious ever known.

Minister Barrett suggests that an endowment for a magazine and newspaper list be presented to the battleship Oregon as being more likely to benefit the common seaman than the Oregonian's silver dinner dishes. Certainly the Oregonian and the Corvallis Gazette should be high on the list.

Some of the council and many of the taxpayers think it is not businesslike to let the city plant go without insurance. Fire would leave the city in debt, without revenue, and it would be necessary to resort to heavy taxation. Some insurance should certainly be placed.

At the cost of running a 6-inch pipe Cornelius could get water from the Forest Grove water works of good quality and abundant pressure. \$2,000 would more than cover all expense.

VETERANS ENCAMPMENT

Washington County Veterans Celebrate.—Fourth of July at Forest Grove.—Roster of Soldiers.

Every day of the reunion was a live one and each day of the four saw a larger crowd until Saturday more than a thousand teams were on the ground below the grove and eight thousand people were seeing the sights. Wednesday evening were the opening exercises. Mayor Hughes welcomed the veterans and President Cronkite of Hillsboro responded in appropriate terms. Thursday the feature was a masterly address by Congressman-elect Tongue. Hon. S. B. Huston and Prof. J. H. Stanley who were to have spoken to the Sons of Veterans were absent so there was no special event Friday.

Saturday morning the veterans held a social meeting in Marsh hall which proved one of the most interesting of the reunion. Dr. McClelland and Mr. Clapp proved excellent entertainers.

At the regular Fourth exercises Rev. Mr. Cline, of Hillsboro, offered prayer, Miss Lena Parker beautifully recited the Declaration of Independence. The oration by Dr. Cowan of Oregon City spoke of the vastness of our country's resources, of the strength of our government and the respect in which it is held among the nations of the world. To the doctor the Fourth of July seemed a great school of patriotism, and he proved himself an able instructor.

Phillips of Cornelius won 3 mile cycle race, Claude Hallett one mile cycle race

and 100 yard foot race, Nina Brisbane, girls cycle race, Fred Luelling was winner in pole vault and broad jump. Greased pig was caught by Fred Wilson of Gales Creek. Greenville won the base ball game over Forest Grove, 24-9. The band played excellent music every day during the encampment.
