FOR SCHOOL BOYS AND GIRLS.

Mr. H. E. Dosch, Commissioner of the State Board of Horticulture for the First District, some time ago offered a fine gold medal for the best essay written by a pupil of an ungraded school in his district on the subject of fruit culture.

The essay must be written by a boy or girl between the ages of 14 and 18 years who is a pupil in some ungraded school in the district; the essay must not contain over 700 words and must be sent to H. E. Dosch, Hillsdale, Oregon, before August 1st of the present year, accompanied by the name, postoffice address and school of the writer.

The time for filing the manuscripts has elapsed and none have yet been received. Mr. Dosch has therefore extended the conditions by providing that the essay may be written by any pupil from 14 to 18 years of age in any public school, graded or ungraded, in his district.

There is no reason why a Washington county boy or girl should not win that medal and it would be very much to the credit of the winner's teacher. It is worth a teacher's while to interest pupils in the competition. Interest would be aroused in an important and neglected line and much good done.
