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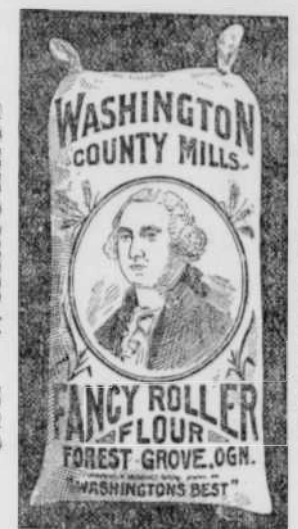

The Quadrant Case.

May, 4, 1870, congress passed an act
entitled "An act granting lands to aid in
the construction of a railroad and telegraph
line from Portland to Astoria and
McMinnville in the state of Oregon."

"That act provided: 'That for the
purpose of aiding in the construction
of a railroad and telegraph
line from Portland to Astoria and from a
suitable point of junction near Forest
Grove to the Yamhill river near McMinn-
ville, in the state of Oregon, there is
hereby granted * * * and also each
alternate section of the public lands, not
mineral, excepting coal and iron lands,
designated by odd numbers, nearest to
said road, to the amount of ten such al-
ternate sections per mile on each side
thereof.'"

The act further provided that the en-
tire road to Astoria and McMinnville
should be completed in six years.
Twenty miles of the road from Portland
to Astoria, terminating at Hillsboro,
were constructed by the company, and
accepted by the government. Five or
six miles more of the road in the direc-
tion of Astoria were constructed to a
point near Forest Grove, where the work
on the Portland & Astoria road termin-
ated, and no more of the road to Astoria
was ever constructed. The company
then built the road from Forest Grove
to McMinnville.

January 31, 1885, congress forfeited all
of the grant to this road for such lands

"as are adjacent to and coterminous with
the uncompleted portions of said road."

The road as constructed from Portland
to the point near Forest Grove runs di-
rectly west from Portland, and the road
from the point of junction near Forest
Grove runs almost directly south to the
point near McMinnville. The govern-
ment allowed the company the lands
within ten miles on each side of its road
from Portland to Forest Grove, and the
lands within ten miles on each side of its
road from Forest Grove to McMinnville,
and adjusted the grant by drawing lines
at right angles through Forest Grove.
The company claimed that the grant
should be constructed as being for one
road and that they were entitled to the
lands within ten miles of the whole road
from Portland to McMinnville. A line
drawn on the north side of this road and
ten miles distant from it, from Portland
to McMinnville, describes an arc of a
circle at Forest Grove, with a radius of
ten miles, and Forest Grove the center.
The lands in the part of this circle—the
quadrant lying north and west of Forest
Grove—are the lands in dispute, the
company claiming them under its grant,
and the government claiming that as to
them the grant to the company was for-
feited by the act of January 31, 1885.

Judge Bellinger decided in favor of the
government's claim, the court of appeals
reversed Judge Bellinger, and the case
is now on appeal in the United States
supreme court, and will be heard next
month.—Oregonian.

Flag Day.

To the Republican Clubs of Oregon:
Saturday, October 31, having been
designated by Chairman Hanna, of the
republican national committee, as "Flag
Day", when all who intend to vote for
McKinley and Hobart and to maintain
the honor of the nation and the per-
petuity of its institutions, are requested
to decorate their homes and places of
business with the national colors and
display the stars and stripes to remain
until after election, the executive com-
mittee of the Republican League of
Oregon urges republican clubs in the
state to make a liberal display of the
national colors as requested; also that
each individual member of the clubs do
the same and wear a bow or knot of the
national colors on the coat. It is the
desire of the national committee that all
clubs get up as large a local demonstra-
tion as possible, winding up with a pro-
cession and speeches. This should be
the program in every locality.
