Sixth ward—South Park addition.

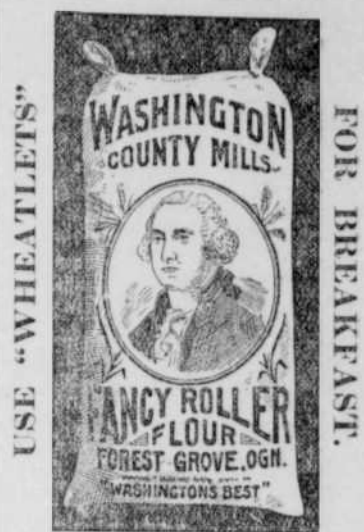

Court House News.

The suit for damages brought by Mrs.
F. M. Bogan against Clackamas county
was submitted to jury and a verdict for
the defendant for \$500 was returned.

The jury in the case of the First Na-
tional bank of Hillsboro vs. E. C. and
Mary M. Hughes, action for money,
found for plaintiff in the sum of \$285,
after being locked up for 30 hours. The
jury failed to agree in the same case at
the last March term of court.

The grand jury returned a true bill
against Charles and Walter Bennett,
aged 14 and 16 respectively, for defacing
a public building. On being arraigned,
each pleaded guilty and sentence was by
the court suspended during good be-
havior.

An amendment to the constitution of
the Inter-Collegiate Oratorical Associa-
tion of Oregon providing for a change in
the system of marking has been pro-
posed. It is thought the change will
secure more fairness in the marks of the
efforts of candidates for the medal at the
annual contest. Such an amendment
will have to receive a three-fourths vote
of the representatives of the association
before it can be enacted. The proposed
change provides that two sets of judges,
each set composed of three persons
chosen by the executive committee of
the organization, shall pass judgment
upon the efforts of the contestants. One
set upon the rhetorical excellence, origi-
nality, thought and subject matter, while
the other set will judge the delivery.
The change is a much needed one, and
it is hoped no member of the organiza-
tion will vote against it.
