CORYALLS, Jan. 18, 1895. EDITOR HATCHET:—I wish to call the attention of the dairymen and fruit- growers of Washington county to the short course in those branches now being given at the Agricultural college. The horticultural course is exception- ally good and the subjects to which most at- tention is being given, that of insect and fungus diseases and their remedies, is one of vital importance to every fruit- grower. It is now conceded by all that it is impossible to raise fruit in Oregon unless intelligent care is given in this direction; and in this course each pest and disease is carefully described and illustrated its remedy given. There is a great deal of prejudice ex- isting in many minds against the work an agricultural college, but a comparison of the well kept experiment orchard and other orchards in the state, cared for on the same plan should serve to remove such prejudice. Another excellent feature of the course is the evening lectures by prominent Oregon fruit growers. The one last week by M. O. Lowndale was alone worth the entire expense of the course. The attendance is disgracefully small, about twenty students having registered only two being from Washington county. The expenses are very light and any young man interested in these lines could not do better than to come and take the remaining two weeks of the course, for the most important work is yet to be given. County School Notes. TEACHERS' PREROGATIVES. 1. A teacher may, in proper cases, in- flict moderate and reasonable punish- ment. If the punishment is excessive, the parent may appeal to the board of directors for redress, and through them to the county superintendent, and through him to the superintendent of public instruction. 2. Teachers, under the law, have an absolute right to compel children to ob- serve personal cleanliness, neatness, or- der, promptness, and gentility of man- ners. Also to avoid profanity and vul- garity. And it is their duty to enforce all restrictions, rules and regulations es- tablished by the board of directors for the government of the school. 3. No teacher does not have the ab- solute authority, under the law, to de- termine the branches of study that shall be pursued by the pupils in the school. The course of study must be adopted under the direction of the board of di- rectors, and in this the teacher is en- titled, under the law, to the counsel and co-operation of the directors in all de- tails appertaining to the conduct and welfare of the school; Subdivision 12, section 37, Oregon School Laws. 4. The teacher should not expel a pupil from the school without the approval of the board of directors, and, in any case, the penalty of expulsion should be rarely used, for the true doctrine of the public school is, to bring in and to hold, not to drive out. The continued use of profane or obscene language, vicious conduct, deliberate injury of the school- house, or of any property belonging to the school, are proper causes for expul- sion. 5. Children affected with contagious diseases should not, of course, be per- mitted to remain in the school, at least for the time being. Contagious disease is a not a sufficient cause for expulsion. A child with a contagious disease may be temporarily suspended from attending the school, but should not be expelled for this reason. If the child is wrong- fully expelled from the school, his par- ents may bring action against the di- rectors of the district for damages. 6. A pupil may be expelled under the law for gross immorality and continued truancy. And while a pupil affected with a contagious disease may be tem- porarily suspended only, he should be absolutely expelled for gross immorality as this may be both contagious and in- fectious to the great detriment of the school. The right to attend school without condition is not absolute under the law, but a child can attend school only when he complies with the rules and regulations established by the school authorities. A child who is an habitual and incorrigible truant should be ex- pelled from the school, as this is one of the greatest hindrances to the advance- ment and improvement of the scho- l. USE AND CARE OF SCHOOLS. 1. Primarily the public schoolhouse is built for public school purposes only. An exception to this rule is ordinarily made in all districts in case of holding the annual school meeting, or special school meetings, regularly called by the school authorities of the district. If the board of directors should deem best to make other exceptions to this rule, for evening schools, singing schools, literary societies, Sunday schools, etc., it should be distinctly understood and expressed that some guarantee be given that the parties thus occupying the schoolhouse shall be responsible for its proper use and protection. Also that the buildings, grounds, appurtenances, and property of the school children shall be safe from defacement and injury, and the rooms left in as good condition as when occu- pied. 2. Should boards of directors deter- mine to grant the public schoolhouse for the purposes designated, then such privileges should be carefully guarded, and the conditions of the same explicitly understood by all parties concerned. A teacher cannot be held responsible for care of the schoolhouse after school hours. Boards of directors are the proper custodians and controllers of school property under the law, and they cannot compel the teacher to have an oversight of the school property, unless such pro- visions are understood and set forth in the teacher's contract. Friends Don't Believe It. Charley Parrott, of Reedville, Wash- ington county, who was in town the first of the week and whose wife is a sister of the Atkinson boys north of town, is in trouble. Mr. Green, whose wife is also a sister to Mrs. Parrott, was in Hillsboro the first of the week and from him this statement was obtained: Mr. Parrott with his wife and children, lives in a house which is owned by an old fellow, who lives alone in a house a mile and a half away. The old man has been spending a good deal of time at Parrotts, and Mrs. Parrott occasionally goes over and assis- s in righting things about his home. A short time ago the old man stayed over night at Parrotts and next morning he charged Mrs. Parrott with going over to the other house during the night and stealing \$400 which he claims he left in the house. Parrott and his wife were arrested and placed in jail to await the meeting of the grand jury. Mr. Green went over last week, and learning that the people of the community did not believe that the old fellow ever had any money stolen, and that the Parrotts were innocent of the charge preferred he secured the release of Mr. Parrott by putting up bonds for \$200, and did what he could to secure the release of Mrs. Parrott whose bonds had been placed at \$400 but failed. She has been taken to Portland on account of the jail being in no condition to receive women.
