Andrew K. Wright died of hemorrhage of the lungs, at the residence of his daughter, Mrs. J. F. Johnson, North Yamhill, at 7 o'clock Monday morning. Deceased was born in Bedford county, Tenn., May 10th, 1820, moved with his parents to Missouri in 1835 and thence to Texas, in 1844, returning to Missouri the same year. He emigrated to Yamhill county, Oregon, in 1847, where he resided until his death. He would have been 77 years old the 10th of next May. Six children, five sons and a daughter, survive him. He was buried Wednesday in the McBride cemetery near McMinnville, Rev. James Campbell preaching the funeral sermon.

The suit of Mr. Stephen Blank against L. C. Walker, administrator of the estate of the late Mr. Strowbridge, was decided last week in the circuit court in favor of the defendant. The action was to recover a balance alleged to be due on a note which had been given nearly twenty years ago and on which from time to time payments had been made until Mr. Strowbridge just before he died told his administrator that he had overpaid \$14. A memorandum of payments copied from the note by Mr. Walker fourteen years ago was found among Mr. Strowbridge's papers but it did not agree with the endorsements now on the note. Examination with a magnifying glass revealed that the figures on the back of the note had been erased and smaller amounts substituted, by whom the court did not determine. For this reason the suit was dismissed.

An Old Pioneer.

Mr. Geo. Roderick was born in Ohio, May 29, 1815. At the age of 29 he was married to Martha M. McCune by whom he had seven children, five of whom survive: Mary L. Shepherd, Elizabeth L. Buxton, Minnie G. Pearson, Orinda and Ida, and nine grand and five great grand children. Mr. Roderick crossed the plains in '52 and located at Albany, later settling on Gales Creek where he resided till about '89 when he with his family moved to Portland. He died Jan. 13, 1897 and was buried in the hill cemetery, Forest Grove.
