### Financial Exhibit.

TO THE COMMON COUNCIL OF FOREST GROVE:  
GENTLEMEN:  
Your committee appointed to report the present financial condition of the affairs of the city, submit the following report: We find the treasurer did not receive the money from the sale of bonds, and therefore could not be charged with the same or be held responsible for a proper accounting of this fund. The treasurer should receive all moneys and pay out the same on warrants drawn by the mayor and attested by the recorder if the charter be complied with. The departure in this respect caused the business to be transacted in too lax a manner for the safety of the city or for the safety of those thus acting. Disbursements have been made for which no bills or pay rolls can be found. Unless these can be supplied there seems to be no other way of treating this matter than to conjecture its correctness, basing this on the integrity and correct business habits of those thus acting. Your committee does not wish to be understood or even implied that they give any impression other than they think the departure from the charter was unsafe and unwise.

The records or reports do not show the financial condition at the close of the year of 1895. The minutes of the council held on Feb. 13, 1897, state the outstanding warrants including \$1,000 note, to be \$2,587.78. Whereas the report of the treasurer of January, 1897, show there were outstanding warrants at that time amounting to \$2,863.28, and \$1,000 note, in all \$3,863.28, instead of \$2,587.78.
