The HATCHET has held its issue until Saturday noon that it might give the result of the crisis which was expected with the termination of the forty days which came to an end last night. Nothing important bas occurred but just as soon as any decided change takes place our subscribers will be advised through an extra. The senate adjourned Friday until Monday, the vote on adjourning without day at first being a tie, and then by the change of Senator Carter of Benton, the man who accused Mr. Mitchell of having broken faith, was defeated. The house unseated the twentyseven members who have refused to qualify and declared their seats vacant.

The situation at this hour is bright with promise for a speedy election, and no better evidence is needed than the pains the Oregonian is taking to convince the members that the unseating of the 27 is illegal.
