## Report of Senate Committee on Assessments and Taxation.

[Continued from last week.]

Made by Hon. S. Hughes during the  
"Hold Up at Salem."

ASSESSOR, BOND AND OATH OF OFFICE.

Section 9.—Real property shall be as-  
sessed and taxed in the county where the  
same is situated. Personal property, ex-  
cept shares, incorporated banks, live-  
stock, merchandise, and property owned  
and used in the county school and road  
district where the owner resides; live-  
stock, merchandise and property used  
in manufacture in the county school  
and road district where the same may  
be on the first day of April of each year.

Sec. 10.—Real property for the pur-  
pose of taxation shall be listed in the  
following manner and the list must  
show first: The name of the owner of  
said property. Second: A description  
of each tract or parcel of land to be  
taxed specifying under separate head  
the township, range and section in  
which the land lies; or, if divided in lots  
and blocks, then the number of each lot  
and block; and, if a city, town or village,  
name of such city, town or village and  
also the number of school and road dis-  
trict where situated, and any other de-  
scription necessary to identify the same.  
Third: The number of acres or fractional  
parts of an acre as nearly as the same  
can be ascertained unless the land be  
divided into lots and blocks. Fourth:  
The actual cash value of each tract, lot,  
block or parcel of land taxed. Fifth:  
The aggregate cash value of all real prop-  
erty taxed to such person.

Sec. 11.—Personal property for the  
purpose of taxation shall be listed in the  
following manner: First: Every person  
of full age and sound mind being a resi-  
dent of this state shall list all his money,  
credit, bonds or stocks, shares of stock,  
of joint stock or other companies (where  
the property of such company is not as-  
sessed in this state,) moneys loaned or  
invested annuities, franchises, royalties  
and other personal property. Second:  
He shall also list separately and in the  
name of his principal, all moneys and  
other personal property invested, loaned  
or otherwise controlled by him as agent  
or attorney on account of any other per-  
son or persons, company or corporation  
whatsoever; and all moneys deposited  
subject to his order, check, or draft, and  
the credits due from or owing by, any  
person, or persons, body corporate.  
Third: The property of a minor child  
shall be listed to his guardians by the  
person having such property in charge.  
Fourth: The property of an idiot or  
lunatic by the person having charge of  
such property. Fifth: The property of a  
person for whose benefit it is held in  
trust by the trustee. Sixth: The prop-  
erty of corporations whose property is  
in the hands of receivers by such receivers.  
Seventh: The property of a body  
politic or corporate by the president or  
proper agent or officer thereof. Eighth:  
The property of a firm or company by a  
partner or agent thereof. Ninth: The  
property of manufacturers and others in  
the hands of an agent, by such agent in  
the name of his principal the same as  
merchandise. Tenth: The property of  
the estate of a deceased person by the  
executor or administrator.

Sec. 12.—All persons, companies or  
corporations in this state owning steam  
boats, sailing vessels, wharf boats, tugs,  
barges or other water crafts shall be re-  
quired to list the same for assessment  
and taxation in the county, town or  
district in which the same may belong  
or be enrolled, registered or licensed;  
or kept when not enrolled, registered or  
licensed, provided, that when sea-going  
vessels registered or enrolled in the state  
of Oregon shall not be assessed at any  
greater ratio than the same class of ves-  
sels is assessed in the Port of San Fran-  
cisco, California, and the county court of  
each county shall prescribe the ratio of  
such taxation.

Sec. 13.—Personal property of gas and  
water companies shall be listed and as-  
sessed in the county, city or town where  
the principal works are located. Gas  
and water mains and pipes laid in roads,  
streets and alleys shall be held to be  
personal property.

Sec. 14.—The personal property of  
street railroad and ferry companies  
shall be listed or assessed in the county,  
city or town where such property may  
be and the track shall be deemed to be  
personal property.

Sec. 15.—The owner of personal prop-  
erty moving from one county to another  
between the first day of April and the  
first of June shall be assessed in either  
county in which he is first called upon  
by the assessor. The owner of personal  
property moving into this state from  
another state between the first day of  
April, and the first day of June, shall  
list the property owned by him on the  
first day of April of each year, provided,  
that if such person has been assessed and  
can make it appear to the assessor that  
he is held on the current year on the  
property in another state, county or

district, he shall not be again assessed  
for such year.

Sec. 16.—In all questions that may  
arise under the act as to the proper place  
to list personal property or when for any  
cause the same cannot be listed as pro-  
vided in this act if between several places  
precincts or districts in the same county,  
the place for listing and assessing shall  
be determined by the County Board of  
Equalization, and when between differ-  
ent counties by the State Board of  
Equalization which determination in  
either case shall be final.

Sec. 17.—It shall be the duty of the  
assessor to call at the office, residence or  
place of doing business of each and every  
person required by this act to list prop-  
erty and furnish every such person the  
necessary blanks to enable such person to  
comply with the provisions of this act  
and require such person to make a cor-  
rect statement and list of his taxable  
property or such as he is required to list  
under this act. And every person so re-  
quired shall enter a true and correct  
statement of such property in the form  
prescribed and the assessor shall  
assist him about the same if  
required, which statement shall be veri-  
fied as in this act prescribed and then  
delivered to the assessor who shall there-  
upon assess the value of such property  
and enter the same upon such lists and  
statement shall be as of the first day of  
April at the hour of twelve o'clock noon  
of the said day in the year in which it  
shall be made and shall have reference  
to taxable condition of such personal  
property at said hour.

Sec. 18.—It shall be the duty of the as-  
sessor to determine and fix the true and  
full value of all items of personal prop-  
erty included in such statement and en-  
ter the same opposite such items respec-  
tively so that when complete such state-  
ment shall truly and distinctly set forth:  
First: The number of horses one year  
old and over and the value thereof. Sec-  
ond: The number of stallions and their  
value. Third: The number of mules  
and asses one year old and upward and  
the value thereof. Fourth: The number  
of cattle one year old and over and the  
value thereof. Fifth: The number of  
blooded bulls and the number of blooded  
cows and their value. Sixth: The num-  
ber of sheep and their value. Seventh:  
The number of blooded sheep and their  
value. Eighth: The number of goats  
and their value. Ninth: The number of  
hogs and their value. Tenth: The num-  
ber of wagons, carriages, hacks, drays  
and other vehicles of whatsoever kind  
and their value. Eleventh: The num-  
ber of feet of saw-logs, timber, cordwood  
and lumber, whether on land or afloat  
and the value thereof. Twelfth: The  
number of pianos, melodians, organs  
and other musical instruments and their  
value. Thirteenth: The value of all  
household furniture. Fourteenth: The  
value of office furniture. Fifteenth: The  
value of gold and silver plate and plated  
ware. Sixteenth: The value of dia-  
monds, jewelry, watches and clocks.  
Seventeenth: The value of all agricul-  
tural tools and machinery. Eighteenth:  
The value and description of every fran-  
chise, annuity, royalty and patent right.  
Nineteenth: The value of every steam  
boat, sailing vessel, steamship, tug-boat,  
wharf-boat, barge, or any other boat or  
water craft whatever. Twentieth: The  
value of all goods, wares and merchan-  
dise which any person has on hand for  
sale, the value of materials, and wholly  
or partly made up materials and stock in  
trade and manufactured articles which  
such person is required to list as manu-  
facturer. Twenty-first: The value of  
manufacturer's tools, implements and  
machinery, including engines, boilers  
and other motive power and fixtures.  
Twenty-second: The amount of moneys  
of banks, other than whose capital is re-  
presented by shares of stock, bankers,  
brokers, or stock jobbers. Twenty-  
third: The amount of credits of banks,  
other than those whose capital is repre-  
sented by shares of stock, bankers,  
brokers or stock jobbers. Twenty-  
fourth: The amount of moneys, other  
than banks, bankers, brokers or stock  
jobbers. Twenty-fifth: The amount of  
credits other than a bank, bankers, bro-  
kers or stock jobbers. Twenty-sixth:  
The amount and value of shares of bank  
stock, and the name and location of  
bank issuing the same. Twenty-  
seventh: The amount and value of shares  
of capital stock of companies and associ-  
ations not incorporated by the laws of  
this state. Twenty-eighth: The value of  
stocks and furniture of sample rooms  
and eating houses, including billiard ta-  
bles, bagatelle tables, or any other table  
on which games are played with balls and  
cues. Twenty-ninth: The number of  
fire and burglar proof safes and vaults  
and their value. Thirtieth: The  
value of all elevators, ware-  
houses, cleaners, scales and other im-  
provements on land, the title of which  
is vested in any railroad company or  
whether any railroad or other grant.  
Thirty-first: The value of all improve-

ments on all improvements on land the  
title of which is in the United States  
or in this state. Thirty-second: The  
quantity and value of all gold dusts,  
bullion, uncoined gold and silver, and  
the tools, implements and engines used  
in working any mine. Thirty-third:  
The value of saloons, licensed liquor  
houses, and the fittings, fixtures, furni-  
ture, stock in trade and effects in and  
about the same. Thirty-fourth: The  
value of ores mined and ready for reduc-  
tion or wholly or partially reduced.  
Thirty-fifth: The amount of state,  
county and city warrants and their value.  
Thirty-sixth: Ferries with their appur-  
tenances and their value. Thirty-seventh:  
The number of bee-hives and their value.  
Thirty-eighth: The number of printing  
presses, cases, with type and fixtures  
and their value. Thirty-ninth: The  
number of pounds of hides and wool  
sheared from sheep prior to January first  
next preceding the listing and their  
value. Fortieth: The value of all other  
articles of personal property not included  
in the preceding thirty-nine items.

## A Chance to See Mercury.

The planet Mercury is rarely if ever  
seen by the ordinary observer; it is never  
farther from the sun than 28½  
degrees and is, most of the time, too  
near the sun to be seen at all. The last  
week in this month and the first  
three or four days in May, constitute a  
rare opportunity. On the 26th inst.  
Mercury will be nearly 1 hour and 30  
minutes behind the sun, and in addition  
to this it will be about 8½ degrees farther  
north of the ecliptic which will delay its  
setting about 33 minutes. Thus while  
the sun will set on that day at about 7:00  
p. m., Mercury instead of setting at  
about 8:20 will not reach the true horizon  
till about 8:53.

On the 20th of August next, Mercury  
will be about 1 hour and 40 minutes be-  
hind the sun, but will also be 11½ de-  
grees farther south toward the ecliptic  
and this will so accelerate the time of  
its setting that it will come to the hori-  
zon only about one hour later than the  
sun. Near the equator and in the south-  
ern hemisphere August 20 will be a very  
favorable time for seeing Mercury.

On December 20th Mercury will be  
about 1 hour and 25 minutes behind the  
sun and it will be but a trifle farther  
south, but its path will lie so low that  
any thing like a high hill will hide it  
soon after sunset. In general we may  
say that when Mercury is evening star in  
the spring it is in a favorable position  
for being seen, and vice versa when it is  
morning star in the autumn it is in a  
good situation to view. Thus October  
5th, it will be about ½ hours ahead of  
the sun, and nearly so far north, it will  
rise about 1¼ hours earlier than the sun  
and its path will be about 20 degrees  
higher up than it will be in December;  
thus rendering it less liable to be shut off  
from view by any high object.

On June 15th, Mercury will be 2 hours  
and 35 minutes a head of the sun and  
about 6 degrees farther north which will  
make it rise about 2 hours before the sun;  
but doubtless none will care to rise at  
2:15 a. m. just to see a star.
