Potatoes, grain and flax are in excellent condition, promising large yields. Haying is well advanced and with the exception of clover, seems to be an average crop. In Clackamas county all grain promises a good yield. Prunes are well advanced for this season of the year. Peach plums are ripening. So are apples and peaches.
