HINTS ON CANNING AND PRESER-VING.

Mrs. Rorer Gives Timely Directions for Putting Up Fruit.

In the August Ladies' Home Journal Mrs. S. T. Rorer writes on "Canning and Preserving." At the outset of her lesson she emphasizes the value of securing perfectly sound and fresh fruit, and the necessity of getting the cans and canning appurtenances in readiness in ad-"To prevent breakage when filling the jars," Mrs. Rorer advises that they be slipped "sidewise into a kettle part may be quickly and uniformly appraisers. heated. Fold a damp towel, place it in the bottom of a pudding pan, then near the preserving-kettle; stand a jar on the towel, and if the fruit is small adjust the funnel; fill quickly to overflowing. Run a heated silver knife around the inside of the jar, to break any air bubbles that may have been caught with the fruit, and adjust the rubber, then lift the lid from the hot water and place it at once. If large fruit fill with a wooden spoon, arranging the fruit so that the weight of one piece will not destroy the shape of another. Fill to overflowing with the

If you find the lids slightly indented, the

contents free from air bubbles or froth,

and the liquid settled, you may rest as-

sured 'they will keep.' If you do not find it so, open the jars to prevent bursting. Reheat the fruit, being careful to bring it to a boiling point, and re-can."




