The apportionment of interest from the irrevocable fund for the benefit of the public schools was made Monday and \$135,154.24 distributed among the counties. This was \$13,811 less than last year's amount and as there are 233 children more to divide it among the per capita is one cent less, \$1.04. The decrease in revenue is due to the increased cost of collecting over last year. Washington county received \$8,819, being sixth in the state, and the adjoining counties: Yamhill 5104, Tillamook 1794, Clatsop 3678 and Multnomah 24497. This with \$8540.07 on hand of county funds means about \$2.50 to the child at the apportionment which will be made the third Monday in August.
