This week's supplement gives a recent and one of the best maps of the Alaskan gold fields yet published. The drawing was made by Mr. L. C. Walker, the accuracy of whose work is well known, from the latest and best authorities, and the photo-engraving was done by Mr. C. Fritz, also of this city. The map will be found valuable for reference and is in handy form to preserve.

Mr. Partlow has received word that a nephew whom he helped to grubstake last year has been successful in the Kootenai country. The young man is a son of Colonel White of Oregon City. About a year ago he was married and left with his bride for the gold country, practically without money. For a year the young couple, one is 35 and the other 25, worked, the husband digging and the wife carrying out the dirt until they had sunk a shaft 78 feet deep on their claim, taking out in the meanwhile \$15,000. Just lately they have disposed of their property for \$14,000 and will go to the Yukon, the lady having an ambition to discover the mother lode of the riches recently discovered there.

The following letter from Con McNamer, dated at Juneau, Alaska, Aug. 6, is of interest:
"I hear that Doc. Ward came near getting hung up at Dyea some time ago. When he got there, there were more provisions than could be taken over by the Indians and of course he wanted to get his over as soon as he got there. So he didn't do a thing but put the price up to thirty cents per pound and that set the Indians crazy, and they wouldn't carry for any less for anybody. The miners didn't do a thing but get a rope and start for old Doc., and to save his neck he had to go to the boat, but they compromised it after awhile. The price is now twenty cents per pound over the Chilcoot pass and can only use horses fourteen miles. But they have opened up a new trail through White's pass and you can pack clear through. The distance is the way we go. Doc., Ed. (Ward) and Jeff. (Harris) are at Dyea yet."
