If he gets 4 1/2 cents for his hops the pickers will be paid 75 cents a hundred and if the goods sell for 10 cents the labor will receive \$1.00, which is about 50 cents a box. A like rule will govern prices between.

The increase in popularity of Pacific Coast fruit is shown by the fact that the single city of Omaha, Neb., has this year already tripled its use over last year, fifty-three carloads having been sold there against eighteen last year, and the best of the season is yet to come. Bartlett years bring \$1.75 to \$2.00, and prunes from \$1.25 to \$1.35 if packed well. This ought to net people here from 75 to 80 cents a box for pears and 2 1/2 cents a pound for prunes. Careful packing will be found profitable as fruit reaches market in enough better condition to command better prices and well repay the extra labor involved.

A "hop-pickers' trust" was formed at a meeting held in Thatcher school house Tuesday evening by people from that vicinity. Twenty-one signed their names to a resolution which pledges them not to pick for less than 75 cents a hundred, and they are willing to ask more if other localities think the present price of hops will justify it. This action was taken because of the combination of the hop growers of this county and state to form a trust for the purpose of putting down the price of picking and their declaration that they cannot pay over 65 cents per hundred weight for picking. The resolution further called attention to the price of hops being high enough to justify better compensation for the picker, and denounced the growers for combining for such a purpose, charging them with strangling competition and undertaking to keep down the price of picking when without this organization on the part of the growers naturally a fair rate would be paid. An appeal is made to the people of county and state to consider the justice of this movement and to join in demanding for the pickers a portion of what they earn.

Shallenberger, second assistant postmaster general: "I have to acknowledge the receipt of petition signed by citizens of Forest Grove, Oregon, asking for improved mail facilities in the territory of Alaska. The petitioners do not designate to what point these improved facilities are desired, but the question of better mail service in Alaska is one that the department is devoting much attention to at present. On account of the climate, the condition of the roads and the great distance of many of the points to be benefited from any base of supply, much difficulty is experienced in the operation of mail routes in this section. It is the intention of the department, however, to afford as frequent mail service as the business of the section will warrant, considering the great cost of operation."

I will see that your magnificent letter is read to the regiment and every man has a copy of it. You must have been inspired when you wrote it; it reminds me of your ringing and patriotic talks to us during our first days of soldering.
