Reed—At the home of his daughter in this city, Aug. 24, at 5 p. m., aged 74 years 6 months and 20 days, Mr. Abel Reed.

Mr. Reed was born near Boston, Mass., on the 4th day of February, 1823. He was united in marriage to Miss Eliza Ann Neil, at Dorchester, Mass., in November, 1848 and moved to Philadelphia, Pa., in 1852, from which place he enlisted in the 3d Pennsylvania Heavy Artillery in 1864 and served until the close of the war. He afterwards lived in Iowa and Kansas, coming to Forest Grove in 1889, and from here he moved to Nehalem the following year and has made his home there ever since until about a month ago when he returned to this city to get the benefit of medical treatment, and was making his home with his daughter Mrs. Lida A. Brown, at the time of his death. He was the father of four children one of whom a daughter, was buried in Iowa. His wife, daughter and two sons survive him.

He was a kind husband, indulgent parent, and good neighbor.

The funeral took place at 10 a. m. from the home of Mrs. Brown, and was conducted by the G. A. R. Post of this city, Rev. Mr. Starr, officiating.
