ORDINANCE NO. 94.

An Ordinance to Amend Sections 1 and VI of Ordinance No. 21. The city of Forest Grove does ordain as follow

Section 1. That Section 1 of Ordinance No. 51 passed by the Common Council of the City of Forest Grove, Oregon, June 20, 1894, and approved by the Mayor, June 23, 1894, be amended to read as follows:

Section 1. No horses, mules, cattle, sheep, swine or goats shall be allowed to run at large or to be herded in any of the streets, alleys, parks, uninclosed private grounds, parks within the corporate limits of the City of Forest Grove, Oregon, during any of the hours of the day or night, except as hereinafter provided; 1st, Loose animals as above named, may be driven through the streets for any lawful purpose, provided they are so guarded as to prevent damage to the persons and property of during the hours from 6 a. m. to 9 p. m. of the same day provided such cow shall wear attached to a suitable collar such tag as said city shall furnish for such purpose to designate cows so licensed and provided further all such tags so furnished must be returned to the Recorder of said city at the expiration of the period for which license has been paid by the person having such animal in charge Section 2. That Section VI of said Ordinance

No. 51 be amended to read as follows:

tion 6. The owner or person having control of any animal named in Section 1 of this Ordinance, who shall permit or allow any of such animals to run at large contrary to the provisions of this ordinance, or shall violate any of the provisions of said Section 2 or shall permit any unlicensed cow to wear a tag, whether such tag be furnished by said city or is similar corder, shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$5 nor more than \$100 or shall be im-prisoned in the city jail for not exceeding twenty days, or by both such fines and imprisonment in the discretion of the court. 
