## SUMMONS

In the Circuit Court of the State of Oregon for Washington County.

E. T. Simpson, Plaintiff  
vs.  
James P. Looney, Thos. A. Stephens, Lizzie M. Stephens, his wife; Samuel W. Looney, L. F. Graham, and Mary Ellen Graham, his wife, Defendants.

To James P. Looney, Samuel W. Looney, L. F. Graham, and Mary Ellen Graham, Defendants: In the name of the State of Oregon, you and each of you are hereby required to appear and answer the amended complaint filed against you in the above entitled suit, by the first day of the next term of this court next following the expiration of six weeks' publication of this summons, to-wit: By the fourth Monday of November, 1897, being the 22nd day of said month; and if you fail so to appear and answer, for want thereof, the plaintiff will apply to the court for the relief prayed for in the amended complaint filed against you herein, to-wit: Will take judgment against the defendants, James P. Looney, Thos. A. Stephens and Lizzie M. Stephens, his wife, for the sum of \$1,464.15, together with interest thereon from Sept. 1, 1897, at the rate of 8 per cent. per annum until paid; for the further sum of \$100 attorney's fees, and for costs and disbursements herein, and as against the defendants, Samuel W. Looney and L. F. Graham, and Mary Ellen Graham, his wife, a decree declaring whatever claims or interests you and each of you may claim to have against the premises hereinafter described, as subsequent and inferior to the claim of plaintiff herein, and for a decree foreclosing plaintiff's mortgage upon the following described property, situate in Washington County, State of Oregon, to-wit: South ¼ of northwest ¼, and north ¼ of southwest ¼, section 2, township 2, north range 3, west of Willamette meridian, and containing 160 acres more or less, and that said property be sold as upon execution, and for such other and further relief as to the court may seem just and equitable.
