The people of Washington County: to follow the farm figures of last week with this more interesting branch of the census inquiry, in June 1900, were 14,467, or 3,281 families, and living in 3,246 dwellings. The stronger sex was so in numbers, too, among them, by a majority of 923, or out of every 100 the average is 54 males and 46 females. While the population has gained a full sixth, and is now about 17,000, the makeup is about the same, so that by turning the government's figures into averages showing the number of each class in every hundred, an intelligent idea of present conditions may be gained. There are 7,800 school children, 5 to 20 years of age, about one-twentieth being foreign born all but eight white, and an army of 3,156 men could be put in the field, that being the number subject to military duty, 18 to 45 years of age, one-fourth foreign born. The voting strength is 4,119, of whom 2661 are native white men, all but 42 being able to read and write; of the five negroes, one is illiterate; of the 981 naturalized there are 19 illiterate, three of the 200 who have filed first papers, 28 of the 87 aliens, and 10 out of the 124 whose citizenship is unknown.

The foreign born were 2675, Australia claiming 31, Austria 49, Belgium 36, Bohemia 11, Canada (English) 208, Canada (French) 14, China 36, Denmark 104, England 178, Finland 3, France 23, Germany 930, Holland 68, Hungary 1, Ireland 118, Italy 33, Norway 52, Pacific Islands 3, Poland (Russia) 7, Poland (other) 2, Russia 92, Scotland 82, Sweden 167, Switzerland 441, Wales 7, other countries 6, born at sea 1.
