A news dispatch in Thursday's Oregonian, from Salem, tells of a young man who was employed in Miller's drug store three or four years, and had many friends here: "Chief of Police Gibson has unearthed a series of petty thefts which have recently been committed by Jacob Haberly, manager of a local drug store. Haberly is a kleptomaniac, and says he cannot control his desire to steal. His thefts were principally of drugs and toilet articles taken from Salem drug stores to which Haberly had access. The thefts were discovered as a result of the loss of \$125 in cash from a box in the prescription case of F. G. Hays' drug store on State street last Friday. Chief of Police Gibson suspected Haberly of taking the money, as Haberly had been in the store that morning. Haberly denied connection

with the theft, but confessed to the other offenses. He claims that a boy in his employ took the money as a joke. Haberly repaid the money to Haas. All the stories that are told to the officers by those implicated are so inconsistent and so incredible that all are looked upon with suspicion, and sensational disclosures are looked for. Haberly comes from a good family in this county, and is well connected by marriage."
