CITY COUNCIL MEETING.

City Council met at city hall in regular monthly session Tuesday evening. A goodly number of the citizens were in attendance. Among those present were: President W. N. Ferrin, Prin. H. L. Bates, Rev. Messrs. D. A. Staver and C. F. Clapp, of the Good Citizenship League; Mrs. Thomas and Mrs. Roberts, of the W. C. T. U., and Messrs. L. J. Kirkwood and others interested in the new ordinance. Mayor F. T. Young presided at the meeting to order. The following all city officials present: Mayor F. T. Young, Councilmen J. T. Buxton, J. C. Cracker, S. A. D. Meek, Mt. Dale; (36m., 33f.) 69.

An ordinance bill relating to the grade along part of Main street, after reading was referred to the Ordinance Committee.

Petition of Woods & Adams for permission to use the street during construction of their new building was granted.

A petition signed by 148 citizens was presented by H. Hanna, asking that ordinance No. 124, which prevents the cows from running at large within the corporation limits, be repealed. Petition laid on table until next regular meeting.

After the regular business had been transacted Mayor Kane threw the meeting open to any who wished to speak.

President W. N. Ferrin, acting as

spokesman for the delegation of the Good Citizenship League, requested the Council to prepare an ordinance for the complete supervision of the liquor traffic in the city. Councilman J. S. Buxton made a motion to that effect, but it received no second. The Council then adjourned.

SCHOOL DISTRICT OFFICERS AND CENSUS.

The elections over the county on the third Monday in June resulted in the choice of the following officers, the first name being that of the director to serve three years, then the clerk and his postoffice address, and the figures are the number of children in the district over 4 and under 20 years of age, as reported to County Superintendent H. A. Ball, who courteously allowed the use of these reports, although busy getting out his own report to the state superintendent. A safe estimate of next year's income for a district may be obtained by multiplying the total number of children as given in this list by 6.50 and adding \$50. GENERAL SUPERINTENDENT WEHRUNG.

Senator W. H. Wehrung, of Hillsboro, was Saturday elected, by unanimous vote of the Lewis and Clark State Commissioners, general superintendent of Oregon's exhibit at the St. Louis Exposition. He will receive \$5 a day salary and be assisted by eight superintendents, who each will have charge of some branch of the fair work. The appointment has been most favorably received over the state, and is warmly welcomed in Washington County, as a fitting recognition of Mr. Wehrung's able administration of the State Fair.

In rejoicing over this recognition of Washington County, The News has the added gratification that it spared no effort, either personally or editorially, to bring about this happy result, and though of a different political faith, was among the first to urge Mr. Wehrung's personal fitness, believing it a matter of county pride and not of politics.

The News' editorial of June 26 is reprinted below, as again timely in noticing the accomplishment of its desire:

"Washington county, the first agricultural county in Oregon, and by position as well as interest directly concerned in the success of the Lewis and Clark Exposition, is thus far unrepresented in its management. As the responsible position of superintendent of Oregon's exhibit at St. Louis is yet to be filled, this oversight is respectfully called to the attention of the state commissioners, in the hope that they may be able to choose from this historic county, whose beginnings were not much later than the journey, about to be commemorated, some person who may be as well fitted as any other man in the state to creditably fill the office and have the added qualification of being a representative of

Washington county. Such men there are here, as has been shown, for instance, by the success of the state agricultural society and the Grange under Washington county leaders."
